Who as Mother Katherine, head of a Roman Catholic sisterhood, is bound by vows of poverty to give her wealth

Under the present law, up to 15 per cent. of an income given away for charitable, religious, scientific, literary or educational purposes is free from taxation. But at the request of Senator Pepper of Pennsylvania, the Senate Finance Committee added a proviso to cover the case of Mother Katherine, and this is now in the bill in the hands of President Coolidge. Senator Pepper said Mother Katherine was a "great power for good," and had established homes for friendless girls in many parts of the

United States.

Mother Mary Katherine, who as Miss Katherine Drexel of Philadelphia on May 6, 1889, renounced an income of \$1,000 a day and took the vow of poverty as a nun, was the founder of the Roman Catholic Order of the Blessed Sacrament. The richest nun in the world, she has devoted her life and her fortune to the care and education of the colored indian colliders of this country and has founded branches of her order all over
