Decide For Ban On Liquor At Banquets

DUNDEE, Scotland, Jan. 11.—The town council of Dundee has followed the example of Glasgow and Aberdeen in the matter of banning the use of intoxicants at civic functions, and henceforth this city will be "dry" so far as municipal government is concerned.

REARRESTED AFTER ASYLUM RELEASE

Edinburgh Man, Charged With Murder of Little Girl, on Trial

EDINBURGH, Jan. 9.—An important decision was reached by a full bench of judges in the Court of Session here regarding the trial of a man charged with the murder of a little girl. When the man, Bickerstaff by name, was originally brought to trial, he was found insane and ordered to be detained during his majesty's pleasure. On recovery he was released from the asylum and was immediately re-arrested.

When Bickerstaff again appeared for trial his counsel contended that as he had been detained beyond 110 days without trial, he was entitled to be set free.

The judges decided that the trial should proceed, the Lord Justice General holding that the provisions with regard to the release and immunity of a prisoner in such circumstances were absolute, peremptory and unqualified.

Boy Dies Trying To Save Sister

CALGARY, Jan. 11.—A gallant attempt to save his seven-year-old sister Josephine from drowning cost the life of six-year-old John Patrick O'Sullivan, who was drowned in the river when the ice gave way under him just as he was trying to clutch his sister, who had fallen into the river. The girl was rescued by Alex. Montgomery, a farmer.

\$100,000 A YEAR LAWYERS.

LONDON, Jan. 12.—Earnings of the law officers of the Crown are set out by the Financial Secretary to the Treasury as follows: In 1924-25 the Attorney-General, Sir P. Hastings, received a total amount of \$950,000, and Sir D. Hogg \$800,000. The Solicitor-General, Sir H. H. Slesser, received \$850,000, and Sir T. Inskip a similar amount. Sir Patrick Hastings, who was appointed by the Labor Government, stated in a speech recently that at one time he walked the streets of London with scarcely any boots on his feet and he could hardly afford one meal a day.

MOURNERS BARRED.

BOOKING, Essex, Jan. 12.—Indignation has been caused here by the refusal of a funeral party, at the interment of a Nonconformist, into the Anglican portion of the cemetery chapel when the Nonconformist portion of the building was under repair. The chapel is divided into two parts for the two sects, and the Nonconformist part was under repair, part of the roof being off. Despite this, the party was refused admittance into the Anglican portion by the caretaker, and the service had to be conducted outside in the snow.
