**THE RING.**  
**LANGFORD AND BURNS.**  
 San Francisco, July 26.—Tommy Burns maintains that the match made between him and Sam Langford, to take place in London in September, is still hanging fire, and will be pulled out according to schedule. If Tommy really means this then Langford will have two big fights on his hands during the month's time. The black has just signed up for a six-round affair with Al Kaufman at the National A. C., in Philadelphia next month. The men will receive separate guarantees, it is said, and the fight will be on its merits, not a frame-up as the Langford-Kaufman affair turned out to be. If there is no stalling, and these men fight on the dead level the boat will be of much importance as the winner will be in line for a match with Jack Johnson. If the bout should prove a decisive one, and one of the other of the men should secure a knockout or a near knockout, then it would probably be all-Johnson for the winner.

In this event Tommy Burns would receive second consideration, and in all probability the prospective match he says he has with Langford would be off, providing, of course, the latter defeated Kaufman in Philadelphia. Langford appears determined to have a meeting with the champion and if he is successful in his match with Kaufman, the big spade can scarcely deny him the chance for the title. Johnson has said that Kaufman is the best of the heavyweights in the world, and the only one capable of making a formidable bid for the championship title. So if this man is beaten, then his vanquisher must necessarily be a factor in the championship game. Johnson, who has stoutly avoided Langford, will have to do a lot of explaining to continue his evasion. If Kaufman is beaten, by Langford in Philadelphia next month, in the meantime Tommy Burns must await his time for another battle with either Johnson or Langford. It would be far easier for the former Detroit fighter to obtain a match with Kaufman as the latter hasn't appeared to be at all anxious about a go with the big spade.

## SLUMP IN STOCKS

New York Market Experiences a Phenomenal Drop.

HOLDERS HOUSECLEANING

Heavy Liquidation Which is Believed to Be an Effort to Retrench on the Part of the Big Outside Dealers Sends Values Down to a Panic Mark—May Be Expecting Bad Times on Stock Exchange.

New York, July 27.—Liquidation of stocks, while banking and financial interests refrained from offering support, played havoc with stock market values yesterday.

So rapid and comprehensive a shrinkage of prices is witnessed rarely except in periods of absolute panic. There was some selling by holders through sheer fright at the rapid melting away of values, but for the most part the selling was done in cold blood and with the systematic determination of a surgical operation.

The absence of the usual talk of embarrasments on such occasions was taken to prove the selling to come from sources outside the immediate stock market circle and to represent losses from large resources which amounted to impairment rather than wiping out of fortunes.

There was every indication to warrant the assumption that some heavy speculative accounts were in process of closing out, while, at the same time, a thorough house-cleaning was going on amongst the lenders of money on collateral looking to the weeding out of undesirable loans.

Occurrences in the immediate news were disregarded. The U. S. Steel quarterly meeting to be held after the market closed, almost dropped out of the consideration. The declaration of the regular quarterly dividend was taken for granted and the probable showing of the earnings report was discussed with only languid interest.

The money market was easy and the rate for call loans ran off to the lowest level touched in several months, while influence towards replenishment of the supply of bank cash continued actively at work.

That acute apprehension was at work was obvious, nevertheless, from the swift drop in prices to a level for which it would be necessary to go far back into the year 1903 to find any parallel at the Stock Exchange. Reading at 1.30 p.m., Union Pacific at 125 1/4, U. S. Steel at 61 1/4, and Southern Pacific at 1.03 will offer a graphic suggestion of what occurred in the day's stock market.

Even more sensational were movements in stocks which are not the favorites of the professional traders. Missouri Pacific, Southern Railway preferred, St. Louis, Southwestern preferred, Rock Island preferred, Republic Steel preferred, American Steel Foundries, Westinghouse Electric, Central Leather and others were forced down from 5 to 12 points.

There was seen in this list the evidence of a concession that hopes of increased or initiated dividends had slender foundation. The consensus clearly amounts to a determination by bankers, financiers and ruling authorities generally in finance to retrench resources and to be prepared for a strain in the coming months.

Although there was a rally during the final hour, the close was weak and unsettled. Sales totalled 1,279,330 shares and only 36 issues of the 146 in which trades were recorded failed to break to their lowest records of the year.

In the absence of any specific cause for the slump, the only explanation lies in the belief that the financial powers agreed that the situation required a drastic purging. Sales were made in consequence, at severe sacrifices. This was especially true of many stocks not of first grade, which have been lifted on speculation based on slender hopes of increased dividend returns. But no demand for such issues were found even at wide concessions.

There were no exceptions, however, to the day's weakness, and at times it appeared as if purchasing power of the market had vanished. Prices were swept downward with almost no resistance. Before the middle of the afternoon session had been reached, there was hardly a stock in the entire list that did not show losses of 2, 3 or 4 points from the closing figures of the day before.

## Big Salt Plant for Sandwich.

Windsor, Ont., July 27.—A new salt company, an offshoot of the Canadian Salt Co., in which the Canadian Pacific Railroad is said to be heavily interested, will erect a mammoth salt plant in Sandwich, and have asked the Town Council to give them a fixed assessment of \$35,000 for ten years, and in return the company will likely spend a quarter of a million dollars in the next five years.

## May End in Fizzle.

Chicago, July 27.—So many complications have arisen in the building trades unions' fight against the machinists that threatened to spread the strike of workmen may end in a fizzle. Reports of six trades where members compose three-fourths of the workmen engaged in the buildings threatened with strikes, have announced that they would not take part in the struggle.

## Delimiting New Reserve.

Ottawa, July 27.—Two survey parties have been sent out by the Forestry Department to delimit the boundary of the new Rocky Mountain forest reserve. When their work is completed it will be submitted to Parliament for enactment.

## Returns to England.

Ottawa, July 27.—The Earl of Lanesborough, who succeeded Sir John Hanbury Williams as military secretary to Earl Grey, will return to England in October. The name of his successor has not yet been made public.
