plaints of the same nature and thought the board of works should not allow it. Ald. Martin-If the aldermen wil inform me whose places have thus been benefitted, we will investigate the matter and report to the council. The board of works know nothing of it.
Ald. Liddy—There was some workdone on Baldoon street, some near the hospital and some on Thames street.

Ald. Martin—Whose places?
City Clerk Merritt—It is my place to which reference is made on Thames street. I can only say that I never said a word to the workmen. In fact I think they are doing the opposite to

beautifying it.

Ald. McKeough—There is some work being done at the west end of the town, but it is being done at the ex-

town, but it is being cone at the expense of the owners.

Ald. Liddy—There is some being done opposite the Aberdeen hotel.

Ald. Martin—There was a stone or monument there that was a danger when driving. After consultation with the engineer we found we had no right to disturb it by lowering it and so deemed it best to fill up the street.
