OF THE RUMOR VARIETY

Is the War News These Days.

BATTLE REPORTED ON SUNDAY—PHILIPPINE INSURGENTS TO TAKE THE FIELD AT ONCE.

Port Au Prince, May 18.—A great sensation was caused here by the arrival to-day of the military commandant of the Isle of Tortuga, off the north coast of Hayti, and due north of Port de Paix, near the entrance to the Windward passage, who brought word to the Haytian government of what is believed to have been a naval engagement on Sunday. The commandant reached Port de Paix from the Isle of Tortuga in a canoe. He reported to the war office that throughout the whole of Sunday a very persistent cannonading had been heard east of the island, and that from its duration and intensity there was a strong presumption that a very serious action was in progress. A thick fog at the time made it impossible to distinguish any vessel that might be engaged.

STILL MISSING.

Curacao, Dutch West Indies, May 18.—The Spanish fleet is now supposed to be off the coast of Venezuela or off the coast of Colombia. Only a portion of the fleet is allowed to enter this harbor to obtain provisions, cattle and coal which were purchased here.

AFRAY OF THE SPANIARDS.

Washington, May 18.—The Cuban invasion was discussed at the cabinet meeting yesterday, and while it was agreed to mobilize the volunteers at port rapidly and have them equipped and ready for any possible hurried change in the military situation, it was generally understood all around the president's table that no movement should be made to embark any consider-

able number of troops for Cuba until it was ascertained that the troops could be landed without interference from the Spanish squadron. In brief, the Cuban invasion is held up for the present and the delay is to gain indefinite period.

INSURGENTS TAKE THE FIELD.

Hong Kong, May 18.—The United States naval ship *Hornet* McCulloch sailed yesterday for Manila. Prior to her departure Consul Wideman took on board Gen. Aguinaldo with Col. Del Pilar, his private secretary, Gen. Leyte, and three other rebel leaders of the insurgent cause. Gen. Aguinaldo will land at Cavite, where 3,700 troops, it is reported, await him, and will make a complete annihilation of Spanish rule in the Philippines. Gen. Aguinaldo has given orders to commence the campaign on human lines and under absolute allegiance to Admiral Dewey. Gen. Merrill and Mr. Williams, late consul at Manila, who with Mr. Wideman accompanied the *Hornet* through the *Hornet* with the insurgent refugees at Hong Kong. Gen. Aguinaldo's past record points to his having control of the insurgents and being able to prevent a massacre at Manila. An engagement is expected in a few days.

The captain-general and the archbishop of Manila are making strenuous efforts to induce the natives to remain loyal to the Spanish crown. The country is quiet around Manila, and the other provinces are reported quiet, except Panay, Negros and Zamboanga, where it is reported there have been risings. Business has been partially resumed in Manila. She shops and offices are open. It is reported that the American steamer captured by the *Cadiz* off Baluca. She was hidden off the coast.

A SPY ARRESTED.

St. Louis, Mo., May 18.—An unidentified man, suspected of being a Spanish spy, is under arrest at Jefferson Barracks. He was found to-day in the mile canal and, being unable to give an account of himself, was turned over to the commandant. When searched a lot of Spanish correspondence was found on him. He wrote the Spanish words fluently. The man is 45 or 50 years old, and he spends his time in the guard house cursing the American flag.

SANK AT HER DOCK

The Cutter *Graham* Meets with Disaster.

Are the Captured Newspaper Men Spies—Damaging Evidence.

Precott, Ont., May 18.—The United States revenue cutter on her way to New York to take part in the struggle between the United States and Spain, was cut to two at the Ogdensburg bar, a yard a few days ago to allow her to go through the channel. She was launched ready to start on her way, but by some accident one of the ponchos holding her up slipped and she sank in twenty-five feet of water. She will be raised as speedily as possible.

PART OF THE NEIGHBORHOOD.

ONLY WAR IS TO EXIST.

London, May 18.—The Times says that this morning "it cannot be denied that Admiral Cervera has lost prestige in visiting Curacao. He is now most disadvantageously placed for any attempt of mischief on the seaboard of the United States, and there were even a thousand grins to the Pacific it has been wasted time. Our own belief is that Admiral Cervera's ambition is limited to keeping his fleet in being. Cervera looks as if, of his political moves at his disposal, this is the one which promises, at the best, some initial success to be dearly paid for in any event by a subsequent collapse."

WAR NOTES.

A rumor says the Spanish fleet has doubled back and is now at San Juan, Puerto Rico.

Spain is expected to commence a war of privateering on American commerce.

The Window is more seriously damaged than was at first supposed. She will have to be taken north to the naval ship yards at Norfolk.

The Spaniards in Cuba claim to have seized 400 rebels in Guines, killing 200. Among the prisoners captured were two newspaper correspondents.

It is probable the Americans will content themselves with watching Cuban waters, and will not follow the Spanish fleet into the Caribbean.

"Marching Through Georgia" has been taken as a battle song, and nothing smacking of sectionalism will be allowed.

The report of a boat being blown up at Cardenas probably originated through the blowing up of a derelict by the Wilmington.

REFUSED A SHAVE

Colored Troops Riot on That Account at Tampa.

Tried to Wreck a White Barber Shop—One Spectator Killed.

Tampa, May 18.—The First and Tenth Cavalry arrived here from Chickamauga Monday afternoon. Within a few hours of their arrival the Tenth Cavalry, composed of colored men, but with white officers, had two of its privates locked up in the town jail charged with murder.

Shortly after the Tenth Cavalry had been in camp several privates were given leave to visit the town. At nine o'clock seven or eight of them entered a white barber shop in Kentucky avenue and demanded to be shaved. They were told that the custom of colored men was not desired. This made them exceedingly angry, and they went away threatening vengeance. A few minutes later they returned and broke a large window in a drug store adjoining the barber shop. When the crowd gathered to ascertain the cause of the row the colored men ran up the street and commenced firing in the direction of the drug store. Fire or six shots were fired. Jud Collins, a carpenter, forty years of age, fell shot through the mid part of the body, and died almost instantly. As many as the shooting caused the colored soldiers scattered in different directions.

The organization of the G. T. R. telegraphers is now reported to be complete.

George W. Cline, of Winona, Ontario, tried to shoot his son and wife, as the result of a quarrel over accounts. Both were wounded, but will likely recover. Cline was arrested.
