TELEGRAPHIC NEWS OF  
INTEREST TO CANADIANS

**TORONTO, June 27.**—A petition asking the Minister of the Interior to release Jim Flood, the baseball player sentenced to fifteen days in jail for assaulting Empire Conway, is being largely signed here.

**BRANTFORD, June 27.**—At the police court this morning Frank Mathers, moulder, charged the Buck Stove Company with inserting a false advertisement in newspapers in Scotland for stove mounters for the Buck Stove Company. The advertisement stated that there was no strike or labor trouble here. As a matter of fact, there is a strike at the "Buck" works, all the stove mounters being out. The company denied all knowledge of the advertisement, stating that they were in no way responsible for it. For the Magistrate Woodard dismissed the case which is the first of its kind on record. Dominion labor officials may take the matter up.

**WINNIPEG, June 27.**—A bulletin dealing with the condition of crops, live stock, etc., in Manitoba, was issued this morning by the local department of agriculture and immigration. Reports of correspondents indicate promising conditions in every section of the province. A falling off is reported in the acreage of wheat, but a substantial increase in oats and barley. The wheat acreage reported in last year's June bulletin was 3,141,387 acres against 3,159,458 acres this year. Last year there were 1,155,361 acres of oats, this year 1,233,596 acres. Barley acreage last year was 649,570 acres.

**BELLEVEILLE, June 27.**—The Belleville gas works, which are owned by the city, were burned down about 3 o'clock this morning, but part of the plant and several retorts are uninjured. The fire is believed to be incendiary.

**LONDON, June 27.**—"He can talk pretence until the crack of doom," says Choixia Money, M. P., "but Canadian manufacturers will blantly reply by continuing to extend to us a British 'preferential' tariff high enough to protect themselves. In fine, the Canadian manufacturer has got it, but has not the slightest intention of letting us into the Dominion."

A match company is in progress of formation with a capital of \$25,000. The factory will be in Alberta.

A New Zealand ship states it was announced at the opening of parliament that the imperial government has consented to advise the King to raise the status of New Zealand to that of the Dominion. It was also announced that tariff treaties were being negotiated with Canada and South Africa.

In the House of Commons today Sir Edward Grey said no understanding had yet been arrived at with the United States Government respecting the Newfoundland fisheries question.

**OTTAWA, June 27.**—The highest comet seen in four years has just come to the notice of J. S. Plaskett, who has charge of the big telescope at the Dominion Observatory. The wandering member of the solar system is approaching the sun and is daily growing more brilliant. At present the comet can be seen through an opera glass in the early morning toward the south-east, and in a few weeks will probably be visible to the naked eye. The object can easily be distinguished from a star on account of its head and long comet diameter. Any person expecting to see the body with a long fiery tail will be disappointed because this popular notion of a comet is rarely realized. The comet will increase in brightness till September, when it can be nearest the sun. During this time the curious comet will be an object of daily observation by Mr. Plaskett.

The sun spots which came into view some time ago disappeared yesterday. This was the result of old sun turning on its axis, a motion which is made every twenty-six days.

**MONTREAL, June 27.**—Special cables from London say: Hon. Thomas Bent, premier of Victoria, will sail on the Empress of Ireland tomorrow, returning to Australia. He proved the most outspoken critic of the British ministry's attitude at the colonial conference, resulting in Lord Elgin's refusal to invite the state premiers and give them imperial recognition.

The popularity of the Canadian route to the Antipodes was also attested by the choice of the Empress of Ireland by Lady Plunkett, wife of the governor of New Zealand, and daughter, Marconi and his wife will also sail tomorrow in connection with his Canadian enterprises.

Bruce Walker, who succeeds W. T. R. Preston as the head of the Canadian emigration office here, will leave tomorrow for a visit to Ottawa.

The feeling is growing that the time is approaching when Canada may do well to put some check on the movements for emigration assistance to those out of work through boards of guardians and other municipal charity bodies. The best classes of emigrants are unquestionably those who pay their own fares. These better classes will go to Canada anyway, and the question is being quietly discussed whether Canada might not leave the less desirable, who need assistance, to Australia and other colonies.
