ENGINEER MURDOGH MAKES

NO RECOMMENDATIONS

Report of Trip Contains Only Statement of Information Gathered—Says City Has Enough Officials But Wants an Assistant.

The report of Engineer Murdoch concerning his recent extended trip through Upper Canada and American cities has at last been placed at the disposal of the city council. It consists of about twenty pages of closely typewritten manuscript, and contains a large amount of useful information. He touches on methods of civic government and administration, with particulars regarding a great many features of civic work. Among other matters, the engineer reports quite fully on the system of selecting employees by civil service examination. He says he was treated with the utmost courtesy by all the officials whom he met, and was supplied with a large quantity of useful matter giving further information. The report is concluded with the following statement: "Concerning reorganization in this city, your engineer has no suggestions to make. The information acquired while abroad has been placed at your disposal and it is for your honorable committee to apply it in such form as you may consider best. In the office of the city engineer it will be necessary to have at least one permanent assistant, and perhaps at times a surveyor may have to be employed to do extra work that cannot be undertaken by the engineer and his assistant. Otherwise the officials and employees now in the city's service are quite numerous enough to do all the work that is required of them at present. This is the report for which the reorganization committee was waiting a couple of months before tackling the problem for which they are appointed. Ald. Kelley, in conversation with the Star this morning said that he had expected that the report would contain some definite recommendations but they would have to draw their own conclusions. A meeting of the committee will be arranged next week when the report will be given careful consideration."

THE SIX DAY RACE

NEW YORK, Mar. 12.—With about fourteen hours remaining to the finish of the six day go as you please race at Madison Square Garden, at 8 a. m. Chot and Orphe, of Fremont team, still held the lead by about 21 miles and appeared to have a strong hold on the first place and a cash prize of \$1,000. The race is scheduled to finish a few minutes after 10 o'clock tonight. Davis and Metcher were in second place and had a big lead over Dinsen and Prouty. Helmsman, of the Chicago team, appeared to be considerably exhausted today and although his partner Corrie, has kept hard at work on the track the Chicago team had fallen back to sixth place, where they appear to be secure, as the Irish team, Feagan and Curtis, also were showing signs of exhaustion. SIXTEEN DEATHS IN THE CITY LAST WEEK

Due to Fourteen Different Causes—Who the Deceased Are.

There were sixteen burial permits issued in St. John during the past week. There were two victims each to phthisis and pneumonia, and one each to paralysis, gastritis, inanition, enteritis, premature birth, cerebral girona, carcinoma uteri, broncho-pneumonia, intestinal hemorrhage, congestion of the lungs, perforated gasture ulcer, and chronic parenchymatous nephritis.

TALK ABOUT SPEEDY TRIALS; THIS BREAKS THE RECORD

An Hour and a Half After the Robbery Was Reported, the Thief Was Sentenced to a Year in Jail

Police Sgt. Baxter made a rather quick capture this morning when he arrested Wm. Parks on the charge of stealing a silver watch and chain valued at \$14, the property of John Fox, and a pair of rubbers and shoes valued at two dollars from George Coleman. The matter was reported to Sgt. Campbell about 9:30 o'clock this morning and a half hour later the sergeant had the thief and the stolen property. John Fox today gave evidence that he was a cottionman on the steamer Hesperian lying at Sand Point. The defendant slept in the same compartment as the witness last night, and was missing this morning as were the witnesses' watch and chain. George Coleman gave evidence that he recognized he missed his shoes and rubbers. He was sent into a Water street saloon by Sgt. Baxter and identified the defendant as the man who had been on board the ship last night and also identified the stolen shoes, which were being worn by the defendant who left his old shoes for the witness to wear. Sam Margolis, who is a clerk in Isaac Williams' store on Dock street, identified the defendant as a man who sold the watch for a dollar. The defendant signed his name as William Parker. Sgt. Baxter gave evidence regarding the arrest and finding of the stolen property. The defendant told the officer that the watch was in a Dock street store. The defendant said he had no statement to make. After an address from the magistrate the prisoner was adjudged guilty and sentenced to a term of six months for stealing the shoes and at the termination of that term the defendant is to return to jail for six months longer for stealing the watch. It was a quick termination of justice Parks was arrested, tried, found guilty and sentenced to a year in jail, all within an hour and a half.

MAY ASK COUNCIL TO SUPPORT PLAYGROUNDS

The Mayor has received a communication from Miss Peters, of the Women's Council Playgrounds Committee, regarding the action recently taken by the School Board in deciding not to take over the summer playgrounds. She intimates that the Common Council may be asked for an appropriation of sufficient size to pay the expenses of the playgrounds at Centennial and Winter Street Schools, which, she says, are the only school grounds fitted for the work. She points out that the equipment has all been paid for and almost the only expense will be for supervision.

POLICE COURT.

There were nine prisoners on the police court bench this morning. Wm. Costello was charged with being drunk on Erin street and tearing Policeman Hoves' coat. He was fined \$5 or 30 days jail. Wesley Goodwin pleaded guilty to being drunk on Mill street, but said he knew nothing about being profane and resisting the police. Officer Finley told of giving the defendant a number of chances to get off the street. He became profane and when placed under arrest he resisted violently and during the struggle the policeman received a sprained thumb. The prisoner was fined \$5 or one month for drunkenness and \$10 or two months in jail for his resistance. Six other drunks were dealt with in the usual manner.
