

MEET THIS EVENING

Good Game Promised Between St. Peters and St. Josephs—Marathon-Clipper Game Tonight.

A fast game is promised for tonight on the Shamrock grounds, when the St. Peters and St. Josephs will clash. The former team is at present leading the league, while the St. Josephs have developed considerable strength. DR. CAMPBELL CALLED TO SACKVILLE

Asked to Succeed Rev. J. L. Dawson as Pastor.

Rev. Dr. George M. Campbell, of this city, field secretary of the Canadian Bible Society, has received a call to the Methodist Church at Sackville. He has been asked to succeed Rev. J. L. Dawson at the expiration of the latter's term in June, 1910.

Dr. Campbell studied at Mount Allison University before his ordination and in 1908 was given honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity by the university. He was baccalaureate preacher in 1903.

PROBATE COURT

Estate of Margaret Matilda Kinnear, widow of Peckham Kinnear, praying for passing of the accounts and for order for distribution under the recent amendment to the Probate Court practice whereby executors and administrators may finally close up their estate immediately after the lapse of twelve months from date of their appointment. Citation issued returnable Monday, 12th July at 11 a. m. Messrs. Barnhill, Ewing & Sanford, proctors.

Estate of Emma Jones, widow, intestate. This case was concluded this morning. Evidence was taken on a prior day. The husband survived the wife some three months and died without having taken out administration. A brother of the deceased sought for administration claiming practically all the estate under a donatio causa mortis. After argument the court remarked that the Ecclesiastical Court at one time considered itself bound in case the wife died intestate and afterwards the husband died without taking out administration to grant administration to the next of kin of the wife and not to the representatives of the husband, but by the modern practice administration should be granted to the husband's representatives unless the next of kin—that there was not as yet sufficient evidence to clearly establish the donatio causa mortis and that it would be better until the claim was finally adjudicated upon, that the monies in dispute should be placed in the hands of an independent person, and following the authority of Partington v. Attorney General, L. R. H. L. E. & L. app. at pages 109 and 115 the court ordered a grant of administration of the wife's estate to Wilney O. Dunham, the administrator of the husband's estate. Mr. J. Joseph Porter for the brother. Mr. J. W. M. Baxter, K. C., proctor for the husband's representatives. Mr. John Willett, K. C., proctor for the wife's other relatives.

ERIN STREET THE SCENE OF A LIVELY ROW

Saturday Afternoon and Evening Witnessed a Couple of Free Fights—A Knife Used.

Proceedings were lively late Saturday afternoon at the head of Erin street, when a number of men and women attempted to settle their differences by resort to physical force. The fight was a bitter one, and some of the combatants received nasty wounds. Not content with the afternoon performance the parties gathered in the vicinity in the evening and once again started to arouse the neighborhood by their actions.

The first meeting took place about 10 o'clock. After the first blow had been struck a dozen or more intoxicated persons were soon in the fray. Hundreds of nearby residents were attracted to the scene of the fight, but the police were not in evidence.

A family named Levine were among the principals in the combat. After the fight had progressed for some little time one woman withdrew to her home and shortly afterwards emerged with a large knife, which she threatened to use. Another man in his actions dropped a bottle of gin, which was soon discovered on the road by a number of youngsters.

The evening affair was also witnessed by several hundred. The disturbance was finally quelled. Witnesses say that the actions of these people are a menace to the community.

TOOK OFF HIS CLOTHES AND WENT TO BED ON STREET

John Shea Thought Nelson Street Looked Like Home—Magistrate Wants Information.

In the police court this morning three drunks who were arrested on Saturday evening were dealt with. Mary Ann Brookins, an old offender, was sent to jail for two months in default of paying a fine of eight dollars. John Shea was found lying drunk on Nelson street at about two o'clock. He probably imagined that he was reposing in bed for when found he had his hat, coat and boots off. He informed the court it was his first visit to the court in two years. He went to jail for a month in default of paying an eight dollar fine.

Joseph McQuade was found intoxicated on Haymarket Square and was fined \$5.

In all the cases the magistrate inquired of the policemen if they knew where the offenders obtained the liquor that caused their intoxication; he said it was very important to find out if they got it after five o'clock for then the person who gave it to them would be the offender and the defendants would become the witnesses.

George Carandale, the steam driver, who was arrested Thursday night on the charge of wandering about and giving a satisfactory account of himself, and entering the home of Mrs. Lennox, on corner of Douglas Avenue, was sent to jail this morning for vagrancy. He was given a severe reprimand and allowed to go with his slings on the payment of a four dollar fine.

SPITTING ON SIDEWALKS A DANGEROUS PRACTICE

Chief Clerk Reports Citizen for This Offence—The Law Not Always Observed However.

To expectorate on the sidewalk, spit, cough, ferret, etc., is an offence that is punishable by law, and for each such offence there is a fine of two dollars, and in default of payment of such fine the guilty person is liable to a term behind the doors of the common jail. This spring Magistrate Ritchie gave a number of warnings to the public to desist from the habit, stating that disease was the probable result. Chief Clerk has addressed the force on the subject and gave instructions that all offenders be reported.

Some weeks ago Sergeant Baxter reported a man for expectorating on the Water street sidewalk. The man was fined for drunkenness, but excused from the expectation on account of his intoxication, but he was warned to never violate the law in this respect again. This was the only report made until this morning, when Chief of Police Clark noticed a most glaring case. Many damp spots have been noticed on the sidewalks by the officers, but the persons expectorating were not caught in the act. This morning, however, the Chief while walking along Charlotte street, caught John Walsh, of St. Patrick street, making a custopod of the sidewalk and has reported him. Walsh will now have to face the magistrate and give reasons for the violation of the law.


