LOOKS LIKE A BIG HUNTING SEASON

Game of All Kinds is Plentiful—Many Taking Out Licenses But Comparatively Few Outdoors

The opening days of the 1909 hunting season have been banner ones from every standpoint. Big game is abundant and scores of sportsmen are out in quest of the moose and deer. Reports received from every section of the province indicate that a big season is assured. American hunters are commencing to arrive in large numbers and the total list of non-resident licenses is considerably in excess of other seasons. From the Crown Lands Department at Fredericton and points on the North Shore applications for non-resident licenses are being received in large numbers. The New Brunswick woods have been extensively advertised in Upper Canadian magazines. The province is recognized as the best moose hunting ground in America.

J. N. Noble, of King Square, who is the local agent of the Department, has experienced a heavy rush for licenses since the opening of the season on Wednesday. He stated this morning that about two hundred and thirty-five licenses had been issued and there remained a keen demand. Only a small number of non-resident licenses have been issued by the St. John agent. Mr. Noble has heard a number of reports from the hunters who declare that big game has never before been so plentiful. There have been about five moose shot in nearby woods since the opening. The deer are plentiful and several large specimens have already been bagged. E. Coggins, who had an early start, landed a large moose. Many partridge and smaller game have also been shot by the hunters.

W. C. T. U. MAKING PLANS FOR DOMINION CONVENTION

Opens Here on Oct. 29—Executive in Session This Afternoon to Make Arrangements.

There will be a meeting of the W. C. T. U. executive committee this afternoon in the hall on German street. At the gathering plans for holding the Dominion convention will be further discussed. It is expected that the definite reports will be presented.

Mrs. Dr. Gray, county president, has informed a Star reporter that an excellent entertainment programme is being planned. The convention will open October 29 and continue until November 2. That provincial branches have the entertainment in hand, and the local unions and the university of Mrs. C. H. Dearborn, are especially active in the preparation of a programme. Several Upper Canadian speakers of note will take part in the meetings here.

TWENTY-SEVEN DEATHS RECORDED THIS WEEK

Cholera Infantum Responsible for Five—Six Births and Fifteen Marriages.

This week's death list is a large one, numbering twenty-seven. The following are the closes:

Cholera infantum; 5; natural causes; 2; paralysis; 1; typhoid; 1; enteritis; 2; and one each from diarrhoea, marasmus; also cholera, convulsions, heart disease, gastric ulcer, premature birth, spinal sclerosis, cancer of stomach, contusion of brain chronic nephritis, cardiac, insufficiency and congestion of the lungs.

Six births were recorded with Registrar Jones during the past week. Three of the number were males. There were fifteen marriages.

MCDUGALL CONVICTED ON FOUR OF THE COUNTS

Jury Disagreed on Two and Found Prisoner Not Guilty on Five Others.

The jury in the case of C. Bruce McDougall returned a verdict of guilty on four counts and acquitted the prisoner on five counts in the indictment. On the remaining two counts they failed to agree. The indictment contained in all eleven counts and the prisoner was convicted of publishing a libel against Mayor Bullock, Magistrate Kay, Moncton, and Dr. A. W. Macrae, also of circulating obscene literature. He was acquitted on the counts of knowingly publishing the libels. On the counts referring to Daniel Mullin, K. C., and Ald. Prink, the jury failed to agree. Mr. Ritchie, for the defence, made an application for bail, in view of His Honor having rendered judgment concerning technical points in the indictment.

The Attorney General stated that he might demand a new trial on the counts in which a disagreement was reached. He would announce his intention this morning. His Honor adjourned the court until 10 o'clock today when he will give judgment in a number of matters and hear the application for bail.
