Let us “ Cry aloud, spare not, lift up thy voice like a trumpet”, and show poor sinners their transgressions; let us lay hold of the prize, and continue faithfully, steadily, on and on, until satan's kingdom be utterly overturned, and the kingdom of Jesus Christ be fully established upon the ruins thereof. “ For the weapons of our warfare are not carnal, but mighty through God to the pulling down of strongholds.”

The unanimity which seemed to pervade the proceedings during the session with the First Preston Church, and the zeal displayed in the deliberations by all the brethren leads us to contemplate the glorious future for which we are striving.
