SOME BASEBALL NOTES OF INTEREST TO THE FANS

Marathons Have Bought Al Sweet's Contract from the St. John's—Change in League Games for this Week—St. John's and Fredericton to Play Here Today.

The St. John's and Fredericton will meet on the Marathons grounds this afternoon in a regularly scheduled game. Both of these teams have shaken the flux which pursued them for the last few games, and have struck a winning streak. Today's game should be a good one, for although the team from the Capital are the favorites among those who try to pick winners, there is no telling what that aggregation of Page's may do. They have been steadily at practice and are showing an improvement every day. One thing is sure, if they strike a batting streak such as they did on Saturday, there will be nothing to it but St. John. Ford or Flight will get the twirling for the St. Johns. Manager Page, who is in Montreal, will be here at noon today, and it is just within the range of possibility that he may have some players with him. The game will be called at three o'clock sharp.

There has been a change in the games scheduled to be played in the border towns between St. John's, Marathons, St. Stephen and Calais. The first of these was to have been played today between the Marathons and St. Stephen, but this has been postponed at the request of the St. Stephen club, and will be played at the end of the league season. This is the first postponed game the Marathons have in their list. The St. Johns were to have played the St. Stephen club on Thursday, but this has also been changed and instead the St. Johns will journey to the border on Wednesday, when their game will be one of the attractions of the July 12th celebration in the border town. Through this change the Marathons will not play until Thursday of this week when they meet the Woodstock team on the local grounds. The Greeks will play in Calais on Saturday.

An important deal has just been pulled off by the management of the Marathons by which they secure Fitcher Al Sweet of the Chicago White Sox, who will be here today and will be seen in a Marathons uniform for the remainder of the season. Sweet was originally secured by Joe Page from Owner Caminsky, of the Chicago team, but the pitchers already on the staff of the St. Johns have shown such improvement that

Page decided he could get along without Sweet. Manager Donald, of the Marathons, was quick to seize the opportunity and at once purchased Sweet's contract from the St. Johns. With the arrival of Sweet the Marathons will have by all odds the classiest pitching staff in the league. Winter, Sweet, Tarbell, Upham and Nesbitt make a pretty formidable aggregation for opposing batmen to face. The Greeks are determined to land at the top of the league, and their defeat by the St. Johns on Saturday showed them that there is still room for improvement. Upham worked out in practice yesterday morning and made a favorable impression on those who saw him at it.

The Marathons have also a new fielder in the person of one McGary, who played early in the season with the University of Michigan, and is now a law student in Harvard. He is reputed to be a fast fielder and a heavy hitter. He turned out for practice yesterday and will be in the Marathons line up in Thursday's game.

There will probably be a meeting of the provincial league this week when the question of the official umpires will be taken up. The protest of the St. Johns-Calais game will also be considered.

The Toronto Eastern league management has made overtures to the return of George Winter, but Manager Donald is quite satisfied with him and Winter is pleased with his position here. When asked last evening if he was going back to Toronto, George said, "Not at all."

While the Marathons are busy strengthening their line up, they are not inadvisable for the management to get into the clothes basket and get uniforms for all the members of the team. There is nothing looks worse on the ball field than a team garbed in all colors of the rainbow, and the men on the Marathons pay roll are surely playing good enough ball to deserve a decent uniform.

The signs on the Marathons grounds which were blown down in the recent storm have been placed in more advantageous positions than formerly.
