Problems of a Young Housewife

THE FURNISHING OF THE LIVING ROOM

In the mid-Victorian days of haircloth and wax flowers the only task incumbent on a young housewife who wished to furnish her parlor was to decide how much stiff and impressive furniture could be bought with the amount of money she had for the expenditure. Then, after the exact placing of the funeral pieces of walnut, she viewed the parlor with sacred awe and shut it against everyday use.

Now the parlor has become a real living room and its principal qualifications are comfort and charm. It is not the architect or the decorator who gives these, but the woman who makes the home. The usual idea is an oriental rug, a mahogany davenport, a center table, a bookcase, a lounging chair and a rocker, topped by a green shaded lamp of elaborate design and a few conventional pictures. The room has furnished at a large initial expense looks like a thousand other rooms, even though each separate article has a personal beauty.

Before selecting the furnishings it would be wiser to choose a color scheme. If the woodwork is of light oak, a soft brown or a dull yellow will be most suitable for blending of tints. A robin's egg blue may also be found advisable. With these colorings of wall and woodwork mission furniture is at its best. In the mission style a settle may be found for \$20, lounging chairs or not more than \$12 and a table for \$10. A grasscloth rug of blending color may be had for another \$10, or domestic rug of sufficient size may be had for not more than \$12.

LEMON PIE. Lemon pie—One lemon, grated rind cup milk, 3 cups flour, 2 teaspoons oil. If butter crackers use three. One tablespoon of flour, yolks of 3 eggs and white of one beaten, and a little more than a cup of water added. Bake. Frost with white of eggs beaten stiff, and sweeten with powdered sugar.

Extracts from "The Saint John City Assessment Act, 1909."

"Sec. 22. The assessors shall ascertain as nearly as possible the particulars of the real estate, the personal property, and the income of any person, who has not brought in a statement in accordance with their notice and as required by this law, and shall make an estimate thereof at the true value and amount, to the best of their information and belief; and such estimate shall be conclusive upon all persons who have not filed their statements in due time, unless they can show, at reasonable excuse for the omission."

"Sec. 43. No person shall have an abatement unless he has filed with the assessors the statement under oath within the time required; nor shall the Common Council, in any case, sustain an appeal from the judgment of the assessors, unless they shall be satisfied that there was good cause why the statement was not filed in due time as herein provided."

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATION. Any person who is the sole head of a family or any male over 18 years old, may hereunder a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of the homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in possession of the right to obtain a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$300 per acre.
