The Mexican federal officer who

had come to demand the arms then

retired with the two hundred men he

had brought with him to enforce the

demand.

Washington, April 26.—Spanish am-

bassador Riano announced late tonight

that he received private advices from

Mexico City stating that General Huerta

has accepted the offer of Argentina,

Uruguay, Brazil and Chile to use their

good offices to bring about a settlement

of the difficulty between the

United States and Mexico.

This information, though unofficial,

was accepted as authentic by the am-

bassador, who expects to be prepared

to place General Huerta's formal ac-

ceptance before the representatives

of the three South American coun-

tries tomorrow. Tension over the one

phase of the situation which may at

any moment upset peace plans—the

safety of Americans in Mexico City

and other interior points—was par-

tially relieved by the announcement

of Secretary Bryan that through the

British embassy there the Huerta

officials and Admiral Fisher had ar-

ranged for the safe departure of

Americans from the Mexican capital

and the free exodus of Mexicans from

Vera Cruz.

The United States consul at Nuevo

Laredo reported officially that the con-

stitutionalists had captured the city

of Monterey, one of the Huerta strong-

holds, in northeastern Mexico, and a

point of strategic importance.

UNITED STATES CONSUL AT MONTEREY, MEXICO, JAILED BY FEDERALS

Washington, April 26.—United States Consul General Hanna at Monterey reported to Secretary Bryan tonight that he had been humiliated and placed in jail by Mexican federal officials on April 22 and left behind the bars until released two days later by the constitutionalists when they captured the city.

Mr. Hanna's message to Secretary Bryan was despatched today from Monterey. The Secretary took it to the White House at once and it was the subject of a long conference between him and President Wilson.

JUVENILE DELINQUENTS' COURTS IN ALBERTA

Ottawa, April 25.—A royal proclamation has been issued bringing into force in Alberta the provisions of the Federal Act respecting juvenile delinquents. The Province of Alberta has passed legislation providing for the establishment of courts and detention homes for juvenile offenders and has applied to the federal government for action to make the juvenile delinquents act applicable to the province.

D. A. R. FREIGHT TRAIN WRECKED YESTERDAY

Truro, N. S., April 26.—A wreck occurred today on the Midland division of the Dominion Atlantic Railway. A special freight train in charge of Conductor MacKenzie had gone to a point one mile east of Clifton Station when a five car freight train, wrecking engine and cars were sent out and the crew succeeded in clearing the track and replacing the damaged rails and roadbed tonight. There was much damage done to cars and contents.

JAPAN NOT SENDING MORE WARSHIPS TO MEXICO

Washington, April 25.—The Japanese Ambassador, Viscount Chinda, and the Chinese Minister, K. F. Shih, conferred with Secretary Bryan late today at the secretary's request on the question of protection of Japanese and Chinese subjects in Mexico. It is understood Viscount Chinda stated to Secretary Bryan that Japan at present had no intention of sending more warships to Mexico, as had been reported.

POPE DECIDES TO HOLD CONSISTORY ON MAY 25

Rome, April 26.—Pope Pius today decided to hold a consistory May 25 for the purpose of creating cardinals. Among those who will be elevated to membership in the Sacred College are the Most Rev. Luis Nazaire Bégin, Archbishop of Quebec.
