

UNEXPENDED BALANCES TO GENERAL REVENUE

Council So Decides Yesterday Morning - Grant of \$100 for Canadian Social Service Congress.

The City Council yesterday morning took up the over and unexpended balances and decided to place the unexpended balances with the exception of fire and police to the credit of general revenue.

Mayor Hayes, head of the finance department announced that it might be necessary to assess this year for \$25,000 more than last year. Subsequent vote that balances go to general revenue will materially reduce this sum.

Considerable attention was given to the water maintenance balance and it was suggested that a bond issue cover Dry Lake expenditures and the water maintenance balance be applied to deficits in other departments.

Com. McLellan was willing to help out with the market balance. It was pointed out that the fisheries fund was applied to the Carleton water works.

Com. Wigmore would favor allowing his balance to go to general revenue with the deficit if he felt that the council, if it became necessary to have a bond issue for Lancauter and Dry Lake extensions, would support the bond issue.

A motion by Com. Wigmore that his water maintenance balance go to water reserve was lost. Com. McLellan's motion that all the balances go to the general revenue was adopted.

Al. M. Belding, president of the local branch of the Canadian Social Service, appeared before the committee, asking for a grant of \$100 from the city for the Congress to be held here January 22, 23 and 24.

ANOTHER N. B. BOY LAYS DOWN HIS LIFE

Pte. D. Wesley Robinson Dies of Wounds - Enlisted With 55th Battalion.

Special to The Standard. Jeffries' Corner, Jan. 9.—Mr. and Mrs. James Robinson, of Jeffries' Corner, recently received the sad news of the death of their only son, Pte. D. Wesley Robinson, in France. Pte. Robinson enlisted with the 55th Battalion in July, 1914, and after his arrival in England was transferred to another unit with which he was serving at the time of his death.

FREDERICTON MAN FOUND DEAD IN BARN

Charles R. Gunter Succumbs to Heart Failure - Found by Neighbor.

Special to The Standard. Fredericton, Jan. 9.—Mr. Chas. R. Gunter, a resident of this city, aged fifty-seven years, was found dead in a barn on his farm on Brick Hill last evening, from heart trouble. Mr. H. S. Simmons, when returning to his home, after six o'clock last evening, met the deceased's horse walking along the road without a driver. He stopped the horse and drove the animal to the barn on Mr. Gunter's farm, but was unable to find anybody about the place.

The late Mr. Gunter was well known throughout York county, having formerly resided at Lower Lane, Queensbury. He was a prosperous farmer and is survived by his wife, four daughters and four sisters. Interment will be made at Queensbury.

THE POLICE COURT.

In the Police Court yesterday four women were charged with drunkenness; two were sent to the Monastery of the Good Shepherd, and two were remanded to jail. A report against O. W. Wood for having no rear light on his car January 4th was adjourned until Friday. Colin McLeod, for being drunk and resisting arrest, was fined \$48. POPE WILL NOT REPLY TO PRESIDENT'S NOTE.

Rome, via Paris, Jan. 8.—The Vatican denies a statement which has appeared in the press that the Pope is about to answer President Wilson's note in approximately the same terms as Spain. It is pointed out that as there are no diplomatic relations between the United States and the Holy See the Pope has no official communication of President Wilson's note, and thus could not answer, in any form, although it is said that he strongly sympathizes with the intents and aims of the president.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

The sole head of a family, or any male over 19 years of age, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$5.00 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after obtaining pre-emption patent, also to engage in cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homestead rights may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$10.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$500. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction by the Department of the Interior. Pre-emption patent may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions. W.
