The Yacht Racing

Preparations Being Made for Royal St. Lawrence Challenge Cup at White Bear Lake, Minn.

Montreal, June 17.—(By Canadian Press)—Yachtsmen of Lake St. Louis, the locale of a number of great international races for the Seawanhauk Cup before this trophy was won by the Manchester, N. Y. Yacht club, are getting ready to begin operations today to win back the Royal St. Lawrence Challenge Cup for "B" class boats, won by the White Bear Yacht Club, St. Paul, Minn., here last year.

The races for the trophy, which was donated by G. H. Dyer, then commodore of the Royal St. Lawrence Yacht Club, as a perpetual memorial to his fellow members who served overseas during the war, will take place on the waters of the holder on July 29, 30 and August 1.

Last summer the White Bear Yacht Club challenged the local club for this trophy, and was successful in carrying it off, their yachts, Booter and Freebooter, crossing the line first and second in each of the two races of Lake St. Louis. The new type of boat of the winners was a revolution to local yachtsmen, who were represented by two boats, Beaver and Redpath, constructed along the lines of older boats.

This year the challengers will likely be represented by boats of the new type, three new yachts having been constructed for members of the Royal St. Lawrence Yacht Club. These boats, with any other boats which their owners think fit enough, will enter a series of trial races for the selection of two challengers which begin today. The trials will be continued on June 24 and July 1 and 2.

The first of the new boats was built by a syndicate composed of Fred W. Nelson, commodore of the Royal St. Lawrence Yacht Club, Senator Smeaton White, C. E. Neil, A. J. Brown, K. C. Frank Scott and Col. Hebert Nelson. This yacht was designed by Leslie R. Thompson, secretary of the Utilization Board of Canada. The second yacht was built by J. M. McIntyre from designs by W. T. Bailey, a member of the engineering staff of a local bridge constructing company.

The third yacht was designed by S. Poe and G. Notman and was built by a syndicate of members of the club. The three new yachts are of the new type, hulls and fitted with bilge boards and double rudders. To conform to the regulations for "B" class boats, they are limited to 33 feet in length and to 350 feet of canvas in mainsail and jib.

The challengers ultimately accepted will be shipped by freight to St. Paul, Minn.

The races are decided on points, four for first place, three for second, two for third and one for fourth.
