Scrap Iron—A Lively Debate in the Commons.

The debate on the wondrous Cartwright tariff has been a rather lively one from the first. When it is remembered that the Canada Gazette, month after month, published statements of revenue and expenditure showing that the country was steadily getting into debt, the proposition before the Board of Trade speaks for itself.
