OTTAWA, June 25.—Parliament is grinding steadily away at its legisla-tive program, and if the present rate of progress is continued prorogation by July 5 is possible. The budget pro-posals were finally disposed of to-

The only amendment was one moved by the Opposition, to put oil for sphalt on the free list. It was pro-losed by Mr. Joseph Archambault, who posed by Mr. Joseph Archambault, who claimed that to put oil on the free list would encourage the good roads movement. Suggestions were made by James

Mr. Ballantyne ex-plained that the purpose of the bill was to prevent Canadian shipping falling into the hands of enemy na-tions. It provided that no transfer of a Canadian vessel or of a morti-gage on a Canadian ship could take the place without the authority of the marine department.

Dr. Michael Clark wented to know how it would be possible to get indemnities from enemy countries unless they were allowed shipping fecilities Peece would be signed and then war measures such as this bill should be unnecessary.

The Minister of Marine remarked The Minister of Marine remarked that Great Britain has passed a bill practically the same ax the one under discussion. Personally he would be strongly opposed to granting any application for shipping from Germany, Austria or Hungary.

Dr. Clark said that he believed in intimating England when she said good things, but not when she made mistakes. He did not want to see any bill passed which was going to perpetuate inbred hatred and jealousy. He regarded the bill before the House as of that nature.

The committee is making a number of important recommendations to the Government, and is suggesting mediate rection by legislation. The report attempts a definition as practicel between the reilroad brotherhoods and the companies.

The commission found that owing to the enormous distances in Canada, and varying condition in each province, it is difficult to apply the plan as leid down by the Whitley report for England.

The Whitley report provided for the appointment of a joint standing industrial council in each important industry.
