upon the Great King our gifts.  
Let us offer the gold of united,  
loyal service, the frankincense of  
thankfulness, and the fragrant myrror  
of devotion to a world ideal of peace  
and fraternity.

Might not this thanksgiving for  
deliverance from implacable oppres-  
sion and militarism partake of the  
nature of a "talent" gift.

Let the millionaire give of his mil-  
lions, the capitalist of his wealth as  
the widow of her mite--each in mea-  
sure as God has blessed us--then will  
our national gift be a magnificent one  
and worthy of the service and sacrifice  
and heroism of our staunch defenders.

It is very well to laud our soldier  
lads, but this is not enough. To these  
saviors of our country, and of democ-  
racy some tangible proof of the na-  
tion's gratitude should be forthcoming.  
And what time more opportune than  
Canada's Peace Day?

To every humble home in our Dom-  
inion where at the twilight hour, baby  
lips have lisped a prayer for Daddy's  
return, this nation's thanks are due.

To every place beneath the maple  
shade, where the service flag in the  
window marks that from that spot a  
champion of freedom went forth to  
strike his blow against militarism  
and to the thousands of bereaved fire  
sides, where the vacant chair stands  
a mute witness of the supreme sacri-  
fice paid, this nation's supreme thanks  
are due.

Canada must never forget how on  
the battle-fields of Europe, her brave  
sons fought from farmstead and work-  
shop, from factory and from mine,  
met the shock of the flower of the  
German army--The Kaiser's cherished

Uhlans--and did not break! How  
that day Paris was saved and with  
Paris, France, and with France the  
World.

Nor how at Ypres her stalwart  
youth writhed in the agonies of poi-  
son gas and liquid fire, suffering un-  
danted immovably, the tortures of  
that poisoned hell, with a sublime  
courage that places them forever on  
history's lustrous page beside Leon da  
Immortal Three Hundred and "The  
Noble Six Hundred" of the Light  
Brigade.

The spirit of our Canadian boys  
was resilient, unquenchable, and on  
that deathless day in April 1916,  
Calais was saved and with Calais,  
England and with England, a second  
time the world!

Therefore, we believe it would be  
fitting that Canada's Peace celebra-  
tion assume the form of a National  
Thanks-offering, and that she devote  
a part of this Peace Gift to the crea-  
tion of a Soldier's National Trust  
Fund as a tangible testimonial of a

our soldier lads, and a mighty grate-  
ful and solemn reverence for our  
revered Canadian dead.

As we were heroically great in our  
disaster and sorrow, so let us be nobly  
great in our triumph and joy, and above  
all let us be thankful.

Let this be the nation's prayer:  
"That He would grant unto us that  
we being delivered out of the hand of  
our enemies might serve Him without  
fear in Holiness and Righteousness  
before Him all the days of our nation-  
al life, that Canada as a great free nation  
may tread worthily with the other  
members of a League of Nations the  
path of peace and world fraternity  
blessed by the blood of millions spent  
in the struggle."

In our day of rejoicing while joy-  
bells ring from every altar in our land  
let praise ascend, and let there be  
triumphant, inspiring music. Let  
all the nations unite in a majestic  
Procession of World fraternity that  
shall extend throughout the ages  
with never again a Recessional or a  
reversion to the infinite horrors of war.

Let "O Canada" be sung from ocean

fore sung it!

Nor, let the "Recessional" be for-

"Lord God of Hosts be with us yet.  
Lest we forget, lest we forget."
