BODIES OF THE EIGHTEEN AMERICANS REACH EL PASO

Two Former Villa Colonels Were in Charge of the Mexicans Responsible For the Killing.

By Special Wire to the Courier.

El Paso, Texas, Jan. 13.—The bodies of eighteen Americans, killed Monday by Mexican bandits, near Santa Ysabel, western Chihuahua, reached El Paso early today and were taken in charge by undertakers preparatory to sending them to relatives in various parts of the country.

The body of Joseph Enders, reported to have been killed, was not among those arriving today.

F. E. Stephenson, secretary of the Mining and Smelter Men's Association of Chihuahua, who organized the party that recovered the bodies, said that the heads were almost blown off. "They were stripped of clothing before being dragged out of the cars, and killed," said Stephenson. "When we arrived at the scene of the massacre, a Carranza guard remained at Santa Ysabel where we found a number of the bandits encamped. We returned to the troop train to get a machine gun and then proceeded to the place where the bodies were heaped."

An expedition which left Chihuahua City to recover the bodies of the 19 slain Americans, were informed by the station agent at Santa Ysabel that Benjamin Snell and Frank Woods passed there, bound west, half an hour after the Watson train was reported in trouble. The station agent said he warned the two men to return, but they said they were armed and feared no trouble. Nothing later was heard

IRISH LEADER

Talks of the Rise of the States as a Creditor Nation.

London, Jan. 13.—Sir Edward Carson, former attorney-general, described the rise of the United States as a creditor nation in a vigorous speech in the House of Commons as the debate was closing last night.

"There will be a great shifting, for a time at all events, of the center of commercial power in the world," he said. "We shall have to contend with the great friendly nation in the west, which before the war was a debtor nation. After the war it probably will be the chief creditor nation of the world. There will be danger for a while that a great preponderance of gold and credit in that country will exchange to a large extent the working out of the great matter of exchange and the necessary accompaniments of the greatest clearing house in the world.

The one great lesson of the war, Sir Edward said, was that international law, treaties and conventions have all broken down.

"We have to learn," he continued, "that the more expensive institution is a state unprepared for all evil under all governments—the misleading of our people by the science of vote catching."

SEVERAL SHIPS

Are Crowded Off the Coast of Kent Bound for Rotterdam.

London, Jan. 13.—The Downs, that portion of the North Sea off the coast of Kent, between Ramsgate and South Foreland, is filled with ships bound for Rotterdam, which have not been permitted to proceed on their voyage. British ships are forbidden to continue their voyage to Holland and neutral vessels are not being given the course by the admiralty.

In official circles it is said that the stoppage is due to the danger of German mines, which they alleged have been sown along the Dutch coast and that the vessels will not be allowed to proceed until the mines have been swept up.

PROPOSAL OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST LAND REGULATIONS.

THE sole head of a family, or any male over 16 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub Agency), on certain conditions.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homestead may be situated on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required on the homestead if residence is performed in the vicinity.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$2.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$500.

Duties.—Six months' residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. Settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$2.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$500.

The area of cultivation is subject to re-forestation in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Five acres may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.
