Board discusses issues

The SUB Board held its regular open meeting last Friday. Main topics discussed were an energy audit, Fundraising, referendum follow-up, and a security door for CHSR-

Officials had been seen ground the building over the previous few days taking measurements. This was for an energy audit the board commissioned to try and find ways to economise. The SUB spends many thousands of dollars on service costs. As an example, over the first nine months of 1981, one million gallons of water were used.

A motion was passed to present the university development committee with six packages of possible renovations. The development committee is organising the university fund-raising drive; and the renovation packages will be looked at and narrowed down to one or two by this group.

All sectors of the university are giving suggestions for renovations, purchases, additions which will form the basis of what donors will actually contribute to. At the SUB Board meeting, it was pointed out that none of the packages might be adopted, or even more than one.

Three possibilities were suggested as for what to do now that the referendum has fail-

Firstly the SUB Board could do nothing. Secondly, they could take the same plan to the students again in the spring; and thirdly, they could work with the SRC to develop a new plan that meets the objectives of the students.

The third option was approved. It was pointed out that even though the plan presented in the referendum was good, "justice must not only be done, but must be seen to be done." It was decided to go around and see exactly what students want, to meet

with concerned groups such as directors. CAUSE, and to set up a committee to invite concerned people to speak.

The form of this committee was the subject of debate. Three possibilities were lock-

The SUB Board could appoint a steering committee which would form a plan of action. Then a larger committee would be formed to actually do the work of questioning students.

Secondly, the SUB Board could ask for submission of detailed applications to the committee which would be appointed by the SRC's. This committee would then do all the work of sounding out student

The third option was for the SUB board to ask for submissions, and then form a committee to analyse these later. No concensus was reached on any option, and it was agreed to put them before the SRC's of UNB and STU.

CHSR had failed previously in a bid to have an \$800 security door approved by the SUB Board, and at Friday's meeting they tried again.

Station manager Paul Buckley said the installation of the door had been approved by the fire marshall, physical plant and the CHSR board of

The purpose of the door is to prevent theft. It would be locked in the evening and only the DJ would be able to let people in. It would be installed across the corridor at the top of the stairs leading up to the station.

The SUB board contended that the problem was probably internal, especially as far as stolen albums were concerned. Buckley said the problem though becomes broader if anyone can walk through. He said over \$2,000 worth of equipment was stolen last year. There is over \$300,000 in equipment at the station he went on, of which \$100,000 is irreplaceable albums. He said the security measure would take the load off people.

The SUB board said they would look into the situation and bring it up at the

December meeting.

It was mentioned that the SUB has been criticized for having a surplus. This in fact is a reserve fund for an uninsurable emergency, such as an explosion of a Beaver Foods

Dates for SUB operation during the Christmas break were announced. It will close on the 24th at 5 pm, and remain closed Christmas and Boxing Days. It will be open from 10 am. to 10 pm. on December 27 and will be open normal hours, 7 am. to midnight, on December 28 and 29. It will close at 5 pm. on New Years Eve and remain closed all January 1. On January 2 it will operate 10 am, to 10 pm, and will revert to normal hours after that. The SRC office will be closed December 19 to January 5 in-


