

A. I don't know anything about that.

Q. Does any part of this Kemano reserve overflow with the high tides at any time?

A. Yes. (Indicating on plan) This is the narrowest part right here - the high tide floods that.

Q. Have you yourself seen the water cover that?

A. Yes.

Q. Well, would that trouble any of the houses or gardens?

A. No. It does not trouble any of the houses or gardens.

Q. Now on your speech you said that you wanted to have a reserve at Grab river. Now tell the Commission why you want a reserve at Grab river, and what use the Indians would make of it if they got it?

A. We are just asking you for that place because our grandfathers stayed there before us. We are asking if you will let us have it because our grandfathers stayed there for years and years.

Q. But what use would you make of it if the Commission gave it to you?

NOTE: (Witness testifies about this matter after consultation with the other Indians present)

A. We just let you know about it because it belonged to our forefathers?

Q. Do you fish there now?

A. Yes, and we have a house there now.

Q. Is there any graveyard there?

A. Yes, a large graveyard.

Q. Many buried there?

A. There are three graveyards at Grab river.

Q. Are there graveyards on Kemano?

A. Yes, lots of them there.

Q. Are there graveyards at Kitlepe?

A. Yes, lots there.

Q. Are there any at Ahkellah?

A. Yes, some at Ahkellah.

Q. About how far is Grab river from ^Kemano?

A. About 26 miles I think.

Q. (The Chairman) Do we pass Grab river going to Kitlepe?

A. Yes.
