BOER PIRATES ON HIGH SEAS

Rev. Dr. Hannon Preaches an Board a B itish Smack in the North Sea and Attack the Crew.

> Boers Breg of Sheoting Natives in Cold Blood-Prisoner With Train-Wrecking Machinery.

London, Nov. 18.-The South African casualty list shows that im the affair at Brakspruit, Nov. 13, which Lord Kitchener reported last Friday, 58 Yeomanry were captured by the Boers and afterward released.

PRO-BOERISM ON THE HIGH SEAS. An extraordinary demonstration of pro-Boerism is reported by a Brussels newspaper. It seems that a Dutch fishing boat belonging to Ynuidon, while off Wielingen Lightship, in the North Sea, pretended to be in distress, and approached a British smack. Thirteen fishermen from the Dutch boat boarded the British craft and attacked the crew of the latter, shouting "Long live the Boers!" Several of the Britishers were wounded. It is alleged that before making the attack the Dutchmen locked their captain in his eabin. The British smack succeeded in escaping, and arrived at Ostend, where the captain lodged a complaint with the British consul.

A CANADIAN WOUNDED. Ottawa, Nov. 17. - A cable received last evening says that Trooper John Hann, of Montreal, who was with Kitchener's fighting scouts, was severely wounded at Freeitfontein.

BOAST OF THEIR MURDERS.

Middleburg, Nov. 16 .- A Boer patrol, under Commandant Theron, son of the President of the Afrikander Bond, captured two natives near Burghersdorp, took them a few miles away, then shot them. The Boers subsequently bragged about the deed to local farmers.

PROVISIONS SCARCE.

Dissatisfaction is said to be prevalent among the Boers in the Orange River Colony, owing to scarcity of provisions.

PROGRESS AT JOHANNESBURG. Pretoria, Nov. 16 .- Marked progress being made at Johannesburg. streets are resuming their normal apare already exceeding the supply. There is a considerable demand for town property. Two stands at the corner of Pritchard street, together measuring 50 by 100 feet, have been sold for £35,000. Satisfactory arrangements have been completed with the Portuguese authorities permitting natives to proceed to work in the mines. It is understood that there are many natives eager to come here. Thus an important factor in the delay in resuming operation on the Rand gress is expected.

AN INFERNAL MACHINIST.

Cape Town, Nov. 16.-An interesting discovery was made at one of the camps of prisoners of war in the Cape Peninsula a few days ago. One of the prisoners was missing when the roll was called. He was of continental extraction. A search was made for him all over the camp, but without result, until someone began to tear up the floor of the hut, when, sure enough, there was the missing man concealed under the boards. Further researches resulted in the discovery on his person of complete designs for the wrecking of trains, and the ingenuity of the invention lies in the fact that it makes use of a pilot engine as part of the machinery necessary to accom-plish the purpose. That is to say, the invention is of such a nature that a pilot engine passing over the mine merely sets the machinery necessary for its explosion. Whether the inventive individual will be permitted to patent his device has not been made
