FAMOUS HYMNS.

Interesting Facts About the Authorship of Church Music-Many Hymns Great-ly Changed From the Original.

tychanged From the Original.

Everyone, perhaps, has his or her favorite hymn. Yet few know its author and under what circumstances it was compose. Take the Christmas hymns, for example, "Hark! the Herald Angels Sing," when originally published by Charles Wesley in 1739, began, "Hark, How All the Welkin, Rings, "Christlans, Awake!" was composed by John Byrom, in 1745, as a carol for his little daughter Dolly, "for her and for no one else." In the original the manuscript is headed "Christmas Day for Dolly." It was first published in 1746, in Harrop's Manchester Mercury, and was set to music by the organist of the Manchester parish church, Mr. John Wainwright. "While Shepherds Watched," another carol, was written by Nahum Tate 200 years ago.

Abide With Me.

Abide with ale.

The popular "Abide With Me," was written by the Rev. H. E. Lyte in 1847, at Brixham. He had be come so ill that he was ordered to Nice. On the Sunday evening prior to his leaving he walked by the sanshore alone for half an hour after he had spoken to his congregation for the last time. When the sun had set he went back to his study, and an hour later the hymn was finished Dr. Monk composed its beautiful setting in an inspired ten minutes. Can on Ellerton's popular "Saviour, Again to Thy Dear Name," was composed so recently as 1886, but has since then been translated intenearly every language and dialect. Abide With Me.

Rock of Ages.

"Rock of Ages"—probably the most popular hymn in the English language—was written by Toplady when caught in a thunderstorm near Blagdon in the Mendips. As the London went down in the Bay of Biscay in 1866 the doomed passengers sang this hymn. It was once translated into Hindustani by an enthusiastic native convert, and his rendering, literally translated, read thus:

Very old stone, split for my benefit. Let me absent myself under one of your fragments.

Many stories are told of the hymns of Isaac Watts. It is said that he wrote "Not all the Blood of Beasts," after a visit to Smithfield Market, while the charming hymn "There is a Land of Pure Delight" was suggested by the view of Southampton water as seen from the Libe ampton water as seen from the Isle of Wight. He is believed to have written 500 hymns; many are medicere; a few will last as long as the English language.

One of Wesley's First "Jesus, Lover of My Soul" was suggested to Charles Wesley by a seabird flying to him for protection during a storm. It was one of the earliest that he wrote. A good story is told of Keble and Dr. Neale, both writers of hymns:

Dr. Neale was invited by Mr. Keble and the Bishop of Sale bury to assist them with their new hymnal, and for this purpose he paid a visit to Hinslay parsonage. On one occasion Mr. Keble having to go to another room to find some papers was detained a short time. On his return Dr. Neale said, "Why, Keble, I thought you told me that the I thought you told me that the 'Christian Year' was entirely original?' "Yes.' he answered, 'it certainly is.' "Then how comes this?" and Dr. Neale placed before him the and Dr. Neale placed before him the Latin of one of keble's hymns. Keble concessed himself utterly confounded. He protested that he had never seen the original. I fer a few minutes of quiet enjoyment Neale relieved him by owning that he had just turned it into Latin during his absence.

Here for Brides.

The now popular wedding hynn "O Perfect Love" was written in 1880 by Mrs. Dorothy Gurney, for her sister's marriage, to be sang to the tune "O Strength and Stay." Sir Joseph Barnby set it to music for the wedding of Princess Louise of Wales. Canon Ellerton's "O Father, All-Creating," was composed at the request of the lets Dukes Western

of Wales. Canon Ellerton's "O Father, All-Creating," was composed at the request of the late Duke of Westminster for the marriage of his daughter to the Marquis of Ormonde in 1876. "From Greenland's Icy Mountains" was written by Heber in twenty minutes in 1819, and the only correction he made was to substitute "heethen" in the second verse for "savage."

A most interesting chapter is that on children's hymns. Charles Wesley wrote the best known of all, "Gentle Jesus, Meek and Mild," in 1740. It has been said that he wrote it for his own children, but this is a mistake, for he did not marry until some years afterward, "There is a Happy Land" was written by Mr. Andrew Young in 1838, at Rothesay, to go with a tune which he had heard a little girl playing.

Juvenile Hymns.

"There's a Friend for Little Children" was written by Mr. Midlane at Newport, Isle of Wight, near the house where Thomas Binney composed his verses beginning "Eternal Light! Eternal Light!" The charming child's hymn, "Now the Day is Over," was written in 1865 by the Rev. S. Baring-Gould, author of "Onward, Christian Soldiers." The magnificent "Eternal Father, Strong to Save," was composed by Mr. William Whiting.

One of the most curious stories in this admirable volume relates to the hymn beginning "O Happy Day That Fixed My Choice." This was once sung at the confirmation of one of the royal children by the late Queen's desire. The next day a leading London paper announced that the hymn had been specially written for the occasion by Tennyson, with a scathing criticism that if the Poet Laurente could do no better it was time objection was raised to his receiving national pay. It was really written by Dr. Doddridge, who died in 1751.—London Telegraph.

PAUPERS IN ENGLAND.

They Seem to Grow Fat-Institutions May Encourage Begging-Luxuries Pro-vided at the Workhouses.

A guardian of Bridgnorth having ast an envious eye over the luxurious accommodation provided at the workhouse there, remarked that he was looking forward to the day when there would be no ratepayers and only tramps. He was but putting into words a general and growing feeling that a check should be placed upon the steadily augmenting numbers of able-bodied paupers, who, encouraged by too little work

placed upon the steadily augmenting numbers of able-bodied paupers, who, encouraged by too little work and a too generous diet, remain idle and wax fat at the expense of the community.

True, there are still a few boards of guardians who are so behind the times as actually to discourage the able-bodied pauper, but the majority of these authorities are in friendly competition with each other in pro-

of these authorities are in friendly competition with each other in providing every comfort for their undeserving clients.

One of the most desirable—from the inmates' point of view—of these homes of rest for able-bodied men is the institution at Peckham for the District of Camberwell, where everything is done to secure the splendy thing is done to secure the able-bod-icd inmates happiness and comfort. The result is that scores of certified able-bodied men who have found the struggle for existence in the outside world too keen for their taste are whiling away in leisured content-ment the prime of their lives in this loafers' paradise, cheered with the knowledge that they are only costing the ratepayer 7s. 10d. a week

Admission to this retreat is quite Admission to this retreat is quite a simple matter. All that has to be done is to plead destitution to the relieving officer, who courteously supplies the applicant with the necessary order. Arrived at the institution he is given a comfortable warm bath and presented with a clean towel and nightshirt, after which he is conducted to his bedroom.

If the morrow happen to be Sun-day, he will in the course of the day he furnished with the following meals. First breakfast, consisting of four ounces of bread and a pint and a half of porridge, followed at 10 o'clock with light refreshments in 10 o'clock with light refreshments in the shape of four ounces of bread and one-half ounce of cheese. Next comes dinner, with four and a half ounces of beef, four ounces of bread, eight ounces of potatoes, and four ounces of greens. For tea he will receive eight ounces of bread and half an ounce of margarine.

Here the guardians have a shameful maxim that an able-bodied man has no right to be in a workhouse, and the master carries out their idea with a degree of intelligence that is disconcerting to

ries out their idea with a degree of intelligence that is disconcerting to applicants.

He inquir?s into each case, and then, provided that the man is in good health, he sends him to the Church Army or to some other labor bureau to obtain work, and if afterward he finds that the man has been offered a task and declined it, he prosecutes him for refusing to maintain himself. If the man cannot get work at once he has to cover the cost of his keep and a little more by grinding 100 pounds of corn a day.

As a consequence most of the men, As a consequence most of the men, on hearing the terms, elect to leave so unreasonable a workhouse at once, with the result that this house has been 120 below its certified accommodation during the past year, and one day had not a single ablebodied pauper on its books. The same system has been practised with equal effect at St. Pancras.—London Mail.
