Besides showing that, as is always to be expected, the infant mortality is far greater amongst bottle-fed infants, it is likely to prove, says the Wit-ness, that the largest number of such deaths are amongst the children of mothers who are natives of Montreal, and who before marriage spent their lives in factories and workshops. Such girls, it seems, have not sufficient vitality to nurse their infants. Next on the fatal list are said to come the infants of women who have a hereditary tendency to consumption, and whose nursing faculties are impaired from this cause. from this cause.

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
