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CANADIAN V. C.'S

The London Gazette, in announcing that the King has approved of the grant of the Victoria Cross "for most conspicuous bravery and devotion to duty," gave the following particulars of the three Canadians who were among the number mentioned:

Captain Francis Alexander Caron Scrimger, Canadian Army Medical Service, Medical Officer, 14th Battalion, Royal Montreal Regiment.

On the afternoon of April 25, 1915, in the neighbourhood of Ypres, when in charge of an advanced dressing station in some farm buildings, which were being heavily shelled by the enemy, he directed under heavy fire the removal of the wounded, and he himself carried a severely wounded officer out of a stable in search of a place of greater safety.

On April 24, 1915, in the neighbourhood of Ypres, when a wounded man who was lying some 15 yards from the trench called for help, Company Sergeant-Major Hall endeavored to reach him in the face of a very heavy enfilade fire which was being poured in by the enemy.
