TRADES AND LABOR Regular Meeting Was Held Last Evening in Union Hall—Important Business Discussed. The regular meeting of the Trades and Labor Council was held last evening, President Moore presiding. Several communications were read and on motion were ordered to be filed. Reports were received from the special committee, re: the re-employment of the Parks board. A full report will be submitted to the committee later on.

Recommend Workmen Property Owners to Support By-law. A report was received from the special committee re: Street Railway purchase, and the following motion was put and carried unanimously: "Be it resolved that in the opinion of the Brantford Trades and Labor Council, that it is in the interests of the citizens as a whole that the by-law to raise money for the purchase of the Grand Valley and Brantford Street Railway should be passed by the ratepayers, and that this council urge all workmen who are not party owners, to support the same."

Medicine from Wrong Bottle. A tragedy of the wrong bottle was described at a Bradford inquest on Tuesday on Mrs. Woodhall. Her husband, it was stated, erroneously gave her medicine from a bottle labelled "Poison." Salt and water were afterwards administered, but Mrs. Woodhall, who had a weak heart, died in half an hour from shock. It was also stated that the poison was a liniment of opium and opium, and that ten drops would prove fatal. The couple lived happily together. The inquiry was adjourned.

A caucus of Conservative Commissioners discussed the C.N.R. guarantee question. Hon. William Paterson, former Minister of Customs, died at Picton, in his 75th year.

Paris News PARIS, Mar 18.—The Paris Board of Trade held its regular monthly meeting Tuesday night with President R. Thomson in the chair. A communication was received from the Radial Railways Union and local Waterways union asking that Paris Board of Trade unite in sending delegates to Ottawa on March 26th, when these union will be heard by the Government. Mayor Patterson and Vice-President John Harold were named as delegates.

The question of the gas nuisance came up for some discussion. Medical Officer of Health, Loger, was present and stated that the government's representative, Mr. Lamb, was here last Saturday. His report would not be very favorable as Mr. Lamb while here suffered severely from the effects of the gas, having a sore throat, headaches and stomach pains.

The President and Vice-President of the board, together with Mayor Patterson, had been a deputation to interview the directors of a going industry which was looking for a new location. President Thomson gave an outline of what they had done and said the managers of the concern would visit Paris inside a week after which if the committee thought their terms sufficiently good a by-law would be submitted to the people to bonus the industry.

The meeting then adjourned. Oak Park Farm was the mecca of many hundreds of farmers from around this section Tuesday when the day's sale of their two-day auction sale took place. MR. BREWSTER'S BILL IS RECEIVED (Continued from Page 1) The town had suffered so materially that they had gone to the gas company, but had found their journey fruitless. No satisfaction had been received. In Woodstock, gas had been installed, but the notice of the people and it was idle to ask them to change their stoves in the midst of winter. Moreover, the fumes in the lighting were almost deadly.

Chatham's Case. "I am the man representing the riding, when the bad gas comes from, declared George Sulmasy, of Kent, in explaining how Chatham had solved her difficulties. Much defective plumbing had been found after the change and they had gone about purifying the gas before use. He would say that it would be a sorry day for Chatham, Sarnia and kindred towns if the natural gas supply were done away with. He would suggest that provision be made to purify it for domestic use and lighting, but not for manufacturing, which could use it as it was.

John Westbrook, of North Brant, gave the case for Paris and the suburbs of Brantford. He had no quarrel with the member from Kent, but a great hardship was being worked in towns he could name. The working-man was especially hard hit. The wealthy could put in coal heaters, but not the laborer. Purification had been started in Brantford, but had not been very successful.

Hon. Mr. Hanna stated that he could well appreciate the situation, as it was true that the change in the quality of gas showed up defects in the plumbing. He hardly thought that the bill as it stood would serve the purpose with the by-law clause, and suggested that placing it in the hands of a mining officer, with power to handle the whole matter, might be a solution. The bill goes to the committee.
