## AUGUST 9 CHOSEN

As the Date for Chatham's Civic Holiday This Year.

Orangemen Granted the Use of Tecumseh Park for Thursday—Miscellaneous Council Business.

The city council met last evening. There were present Mayor Smith and Ald. Fleming, Taylor, Marshall, McKeough, McCoig, Stephens and Liddy. City Clerk Merritt, Major Weir and Sergeant-at-Arms Holmes were also present.

The following accounts were passed: C. Shea, \$67.24; Registrar of Kent, \$2; Wm. Drader, \$136.23; Waterworks, coal for steam roller, \$1.92; Wm. Drader, \$13.60; James Cornhill, \$13.15; rent of North Chatham pound, \$20; hay for fire department, \$7.14; laundry for fire department, \$2.07; Waterworks, coal for electric light plant, \$92.60; McGee & McKerrall, \$3.92; Blonds Bros., \$5; S. Hadley Co., \$8.13.

The accounts from the Ark for \$2.05 and \$3.75, the account of C. E. Shea for \$9, and the account of St. Joseph's Hospital for \$5.35 were all referred to finance.

The account of Joseph Dale for \$61.46 was referred to the board of works with power.

The request of the C. C. I. board for \$100 was granted.

Mr. O'Mara wrote, asking the council to relieve him of his poll tax, as he had been a householder since the 5th of May. Referred to finance.

A request from Kenneth Urquhart to trim trees was referred to the chief of police.

H. J. Black said his dog had been killed and asked to have his tax remitted. Granted.

Mayor Smith—While not doubting the honesty of any citizen, I think that the council would have something definite to work on if they referred these dead dogs to the chief of police to investigate.

Dr. Fleming—I think it would be a wiser plan to make all who the assessors find to own dogs pay the tax whether their canines are dead or alive.

Ald. McCoig presented a petition, signed by John Piggott, C. A. Austin, W. J. Kenny and 66 other ratepayers, asking that the 9th day of August be made the civic holiday. Received.

The accounts of Wm. Bright for \$22, balance due on Adelaide St. bridge repairs, and \$20 balance due on Princess St. bridge repairs, were passed.

A petition, sufficiently signed, was received against a new grandstand to be built on the south side of Grey St., from Queen to Raleigh. Received.

Ald. Taylor said that the clerk had notified John A. Walker that the city would not require the pound on the east side of Joseph St. on and after the 15th of June. According to the report of the pound-keeper six cows and ten horses had been impounded this year. He thought it unwise to discontinue the pound and asked that the matter of purchasing a new pound be referred to the property committee to report on.

BROKEN BY THE CANNON.

Ald. Fleming presented two accounts, one from Mr. Merriam for \$1.25 and the other from Mrs. Whitton for \$1. These were for windows broken by the concussion of the cannon when fired on the 2nd of July.

Ald. Fleming said he didn't see how the city could get out of it, as permission had been given to fire the cannon.

The Mayor—I certainly didn't authorize anyone to fire the cannon. The accounts were passed.

A request from the C. P. R. Telegraph Co. to trim trees was referred to the chief of police.

George A. Sayer wrote on behalf of his client, C. D. More, claiming that he had notified the fence viewers to examine the line between his property and his neighbor's. Only one, Wm. Baizie, had attended. Mr. Sayer informed the council that Mr. More would hold the council liable for all extra expense he might be put to in getting his line fence properly adjusted. Referred to finance.
