QUITS THE REGIMENT. Lieut. David Cheyne, much to the surprise of the military men of Windsor, dropped out of the Twenty-first Essex Regiment. He sent in his resignation to Lieut. Col. Galt on Sunday. The colonel has accepted it.

Very little can be learned as to what led up to Cheyne's resignation, but it is understood that the direct cause was the recent promotion of the regiment. Lieut. Cheyne was first lieutenant of No. 3 Company and had qualified at the military school as captain. When Capt. Laing was promoted, the friends of Cheyne expected he would be given command of No. 1 Company, but Capt. Wigle was offered and accepted the position. Capt. Kent was promoted to command No. 3 Company, and Charles Beer as his first officer in place of Lieut. Cheyne, thus leaving the latter out.

CHATHAM'S SHOWING. Under the heading, "Toronto's Poor Showing," the Toronto Telegram says: "The London exhibition at some days of their candidates for the collegiate institutes in an examination which was successfully taken by only 56 per cent of the candidates from the Toronto schools!
