CONVICTS DRUNK

Saved Methylated Spirts From Shellad one of Them Died

Montreal, July 24. - The death of Gideon Deguire, reported from St. Vincent de Paul Penitentiary occurred under peculiar circumstances. Deguire was serving a seven-years' sentence for manslaughter. The doctor who performed an autopsy reported that death was caused by poisoning from methylated spirits. By the evidence of the guards and other convicts, the method in which this was obtained was shown. The convicts are frequently served with small quantities of white shellac, made up with methylated spirits for their work. Each time they save up a little of what is served to them, and gradually collect enough to get drunk on. They fet the shellao settle to the bottom of it as much as possible, and drink the spirits off the top. In this way Deguire had collected quite a quantity of the poiso stuff. Being a man of convivial tem-

perament, he shared his dose with a fellow convict, Dolphus Bruneau, Shortly after drinking it, both went to sleep, and had to be taken to their cells. Later on when they did not wake up, the doctor of the institution was called and did what he could, Bruneau recovered, but Degu ing drunk more heavily, died.
