

Lo His Parted With Some of the Land Where it is Quarried.

Its Sale Revives Stories of the Sacre Calumet and Former Indian Customs.

The Pipestone quarry at Pipestone, Minn., which has been the property of the Yorktown Sioux Indians since 1858, has been purchased from that tribe by the government for the sum of \$75,000. The Indians are permitted, under the terrors of the agreement, to stake the terms of the agreement, to stake off a portion of the quarry sufficient for the manufacture of their pipes, and this will be retained for their use and will be virtually in their posses-

The redstone yielded by this quarry is a unique product, being a variety of steatite, if indeed it be steatite, different from that of any known European locality as well as from any other

place in America.
As late as 1840 the site of the quarry was unknown except to the Indians themselves, who described it as a spot of great importance to the red man, as given them by the great spirit for their pipes, and strictly forbidden to be used for anything else.

The Indians were accustomed to shape out the bowls of their pipes from the solid stone, which is little softer than marble, with but a knife. The than marble, with but a knife. The stone, which is of a cherry red, admits of a beautiful polish, and the Indians made the hole in the bowl of the pipe by drilling into it a hard stick, shaped to the desired size, with a quantity of sharp sand and water kept constantly

length, sometimes round, but most generally flat, of an inch or two in breadth, and wound half their length or more with braids of porcupines' quills, and often ornamented with beaks and tufts from the woodpecker's head, with ermine skins and long horse or buffalo hair. These stems were carved in many ingenious forms, and the manner in which they were perforated through the centre for a long time puzzled the white purchaser, unated through the centre for a long time puzzled the white purchaser, un-til he learned that they were invari-ably made of the stalk of the young ash, which generally grows straight and has a small pith through the cen-tre, which is easily burned out with a hot wire or a piece of hard wood, by a much slower process.

There were two kinds of pipes in vogue with the Indians, the ordinary pattern made and used for the luxury of smoking only. This kind every Indian was permitted to own and smoke when he pleased. Then there was the calumet, or pipe of peace, ornamented with the war eagle's quills. This was a sacred pipe, and never allowed to be used on any other occasion than that of peacemaking, when the chief brought it into treaty, unfolding the many bandages which were carefully brought it into treaty, unfolding the many bandages which were carefully kept around it, kept it ready to be mutually smoked by the chiefs after the terms of the treaty were agreed upon, as the means of solemnizing or signing by an illiterate people, who could not draw up an instrument and sign not draw up an instrument and sign their names to it as is done in the

civilized world.

The mode of solemnizing was by passing the sacred stem to each chief passing the sacred stem to each chief, who drew one breath of smoke only through it, thereby passing the most inviolate pledge that they could possi-bly give for the keeping of the terms

agreed upon.

The sacred pipe was then carefully folded up and stowed away in the chief's lodge until a similar occasion called it out to be used in a similar

manner.
The luxury of smoking was known The luxury of smoking was known to all the North American Indians in their primitive state, and that before they had any knowledge of tobacco, for which was substituted various weeds, leaves and barks of trees, which, though narcotic in character, were much less injurious than modern tobacco. These barks, etc., the Indians pulverized and called k'nick k'neck.

HERRESHOFF IS READY.

Interest Manifested In Sir Thoma Lipton's Cup Challenge. The report that Sir Thomas Lipton has again decided to come over to "lift the cup," as he naively expressed it last year, was received with general satisfaction in the yachting town of Bristol, as nothing would be more pleasing to the average Bristol yachting sharp-and all of the male inhabitants seem to have working knowledge of the sport-than to see another first class contest for the cup with a Bristol built 90 footer the winner, says the New York. World. The Herreshoffs are prepared to build another cup defender, better in many points than Columbia, by next July, and only await

the word to set in motion the machinery essential to such work. It is understood that Captain Nathaniel Greene Herreshoff, the famous designer, has noted a number of important points in which improvements could be made in the Columbia, but has advised the 70 footer syndicate, to whom he gave an option on his services a year ago, that it would be far better to build a 1900 model for the contest to be held in the new century. While he will not give an estimate in figures, he has assured at least one member of the millionaire triolessrs. Whitney, Duryea and Vanderbilt-that he can build a cup defender that will almost as easily show her heels to Columbia over the Sandy Hook course as the 1899 yacht did to the improved Defender in the trial races off Newport.

Neither expense nor trouble will be allowed to imperil a successful defense of the cup. The millionaire syndicate will have Columbia for a trial horse and, with an advantage of the margin by which she defeated the Shamrock in addition to the time to be gained through an improved model, it is be lieved the next cup defender can be made more markedly superior to Shamrock II than Columbia was to Sir

Thomas' first challenger. The keel of the next cup defender could be laid in two months if one is desired, and it is believed the New York Yacht club would insist upon new boat, unless one is tried and beaten by Columbia.
