SOLDIERS FIRE ON MOB

Troops Shot Straight at the Narbonne Rioters

Three Persons Killed and One Hundred Injured—Score of Women Included—Military Were Ordered to Fire in the Air But Disobeyed—Whole Army Corps in Motion—Grave News From Midi.

Paris, June 21.—The brief despatches which reached Paris yesterday showed that the conflicts which have occurred between the troops and mobs in the south were more sanguinary than at first suspected. At Narbonne three persons were killed and a hundred soldiers and civilians, including a score of women, are said to have been wounded, a number of them fatally. The troops, who were ordered to fire in the air, shot straight at the mob besieging them in the courtyard of the superstructure.

A whole army corps has been put in motion to deal with the rebellious wine-growers.

State Banquet Cancelled.

The state banquet which was to have been given last night in honor of the King of Siam, was cancelled in consequence of the bloodshed. The newspapers report another attempt to burn the sub-prefecture at Narbonne. Gendarmes fired from the upper storey and the attackers fled.

It is also announced that there has been further shooting in the streets of Narbonne, and that many persons have been wounded. Many wine-growers continue to pour into Narbonne, and threaten to set fire to the hotels occupied by the army officers. Fresh troops are arriving there.

Tried to Rescue Prisoners.

Montpellier, France, June 21.—Serious rioting broke out here Wednesday night, lasting all evening. The mob attempted to burn down the door of the prison and rescue the prisoners. The troops were turned out, but were received with volleys of stones and bottles. The troops were pulled off their horses and clubbed. A prominent police official was seriously wounded by a broken bottle. Many soldiers were less seriously injured.

Incendiaries Driven Off.

Narbonne, France, June 21.—A violent mob from the outlying villages gathered here Wednesday night. They poured petroleum over the door of the sub-prefecture, which they set on fire, but were driven off after repeated charges by the troops. In the course of the fighting the manifestos fired revolvers, but no one was hurt. The disorder was augmented by the absence of lights, the mob having cut the electric cables. In other parts of the town barricades were erected. These were stormed by the troops and torn down, only to be set up again by the rioters.

Late last night Premier Clemenceau received grave news from the Midi, the district of the discontented wine-growers, where the exasperation of the people is increasing. Messages to the Premier came indirectly by way of Lyons, indicating that the wires had been cut. The Argeliers committee has been reconstituted, a third committee being named in case the members of the second committee also were arrested. It is now certain that Marcelin Albert has not been arrested, and it is admitted that the police have no idea of his whereabouts.

LIVING STATUARY.

London County Council Will Not Forbid its Exhibitions.

London, June 21.—Despite the influential character of the opposition to living statuary exhibitions and the example of other cities suppressing them, the Theatre Committee of the London County Council has decided not to interfere with the representations. The question was discussed at several committee meetings, and all the members attended a special show of the posers. Many of the committee strongly supported the purity campaigners, but the majority in favor of the posers was large. The campaigners will no doubt appeal to the Council over the committee's head.

STRIKERS MUST STAND TRIAL.

Buckingham Rioters to Be Tried For Killing Detective.

Montreal, June 21.—In the court of appeals yesterday Justice Trenchard decided that the six Buckingham strikers who are charged with manslaughter must stand their trial. The indictment had been quashed by the district magistrate at Hull on the ground that the regular ten cent stamp was not affixed.

Four Shocked to Death.

New York, June 21.—Four Italians were shocked to death and two others were perhaps fatally shocked while tangled with electric wires at Mariners Harbor, Staten Island, last night.

To Construct Battleships.

Washington, June 21.—Bids were opened yesterday for the construction of two battleships, each to be of approximately 20,000 tons displacement. The total cost of each is estimated to be \$10,000,000.

Uniform Parcel Rates.

London, June 21.—Postmaster-General Buxton has reopened negotiations with Canada, Australia, and South Africa for a scheme of uniform rates for the conveyance of parcels.

\$50,000 In Jewels Gone.

Paris, June 21.—During a dinner Wednesday night, skillful burglars entered the sleeping apartments of Mrs. Otto Steffens, an American, and got jewels valued at \$50,000.

Did Not Cut Wages.

London, June 21.—Col. Lamb writes the Scottish press, denying, as reported from Toronto, that their Salvation Army emigrates men who cut wages in Canada.

STRIKING MAYOR ARRESTED.

Wine Growers Overawed by Display of Troops.

Paris, June 20.—M. Ferroul, the striking mayor of Narbonne, and, next to Marcelin Albert, the most prominent figure in the wine-growers' revolt, was arrested yesterday and hurried away to Montpellier.

Before daybreak all roads leading to M. Ferroul's house were held by cuirassiers in strong force. His bodyguard of wine growers, among whom were many Amazons, which had been nightly watching over the safety of their leader, was on duty as usual, but when the wine-growers found themselves surrounded by troops they did not attempt resistance. When M. Ferroul appeared in custody of a police commissary the crowd momentarily threatened to rescue him, but the mayor begged that there be no conflict with the troops, and he was placed in a carriage, escorted by 150 cuirassiers, and taken to the railroad station at Narbonne, where a special train was awaiting and started with him for Montpellier.

Intense excitement prevails at Narbonne, but the people thus far have been overawed by the military display.

Argeliers the state and police authorities, escorted by an imposing military force, raided the headquarters of the Central Committee of the Wine-growers' organization at daybreak with warrants for the arrest of Albert and the members of the Central Committee, but they found that the leader of the movement and several of his lieutenants had already fled. Only three committeemen were captured. They were sent to Montpellier.

Strong forces of troops are scouring the country, hunting down the fugitives. Their escape was facilitated by the fact that the people burned the bridge at the entrance of Argeliers Tuesday evening, delaying the arrival of the Government's troops.

JOY SETS FIREHALL ABLAZE.

Young Lad Admits Causing Two Serious Fires in Belleville.

Belleville, June 20.—Dorland Foote, a lad about 11 years of age, has started in his career as an incendiary at a very early age.

When the Queen's Hotel stables were destroyed on Thursday last it seemed evident that the fire had been set, but for the time being no one was suspected.

When the firehall was destroyed yesterday afternoon, however, the police got busy, and the young fellow was arrested last evening.

He admitted having set both fires. The fire at No. 1 fire station was discovered at about 4:30 yesterday afternoon. The caretaker was absent, and when the fire was seen the flames had gotten such headway that nothing but the teams of horses could be saved.

The fire engine, hose reel, six or seven hundred feet of hose and a lot of other apparatus was lost. The building was completely gutted. Total loss, \$1,000 and \$8,000.

There was insurance on the building of \$1,000, but the contents of the building were not insured at all, so far as any records can be found.

Belleville Hardware Co.

About 7 p.m. another fire was discovered at the premises of the Belleville Hardware Company, of which Sir Mackenzie Bowell is president. Before it was subdued the entire flat, which comprised the storage and packing department, was completely destroyed, together with most of the manufactured goods of the company on hand, consisting of locks, keys, etc.

The loss will be in the neighborhood of \$15,000; covered by insurance.

BIVOUACKED IN THE RAIN.

Big Fight on the Welland Did Not Take Place.

Niagara-on-the-Lake, June 21.—The troops which left camp on Wednesday to defend the Welland Canal in the proposed sham fight were struggling back yesterday. The men bivouacked in the rain near Queenston, and as a result are much exhausted. The march back along muddy roads was also very trying. No attempt was made to have the fight take place.

Yesterday was muster parade day. Every man was supposed to answer his name at roll call, under the eagle eye of the camp paymaster, Captain Shann, and if the men are not on hand or accounted for, they are liable to lose their pay altogether.

Last night the tattoo was held with 13 masked bands, with 300 musicians engaged. Ten thousand people enjoyed the spectacle, and with the first strains of the national anthem every civilian's hat was doffed. Even visitors from the other side joined in the demonstration.
