The wicked man must not simply be sorry for his sins but he must forsake them, even his wrong thoughts and the promise is that he will receive an abundant pardon. The effect of the sermon was evidenced by the number of who rose for prayer, many of whom came to the altar to consecrate themselves to God's service.
