THE COUNCIL IN TILBURY

Visit the Gas Wells on a Trip of Investigation.

THE GAS IN ABUNDANCE

The members of the City Council, in company with a number of the oil and gas magnates paid a visit of inspection to the Tilbury fields yesterday. The party left Harrison Hall yesterday morning at 10.30. They were taken out to the fields in about a dozen conveyances.

The deputation consisted of Mayor W. S. Marshall and Aldermen Austin, Scullard, Stone, Benson, Radley, Potter and Massey, City Clerk Merritt, City Engineer Jones, and Messrs. Owen Sawyer, Stevens, Cowan, Aitkin, Enggan, Symms and the Cost brothers.

The day was cold, and there was a rather bleak wind blowing, but all were in good spirits, and the trip proved enjoyable as well as instructive to the aldermen, who were desirous of obtaining practical information with regard to the gas fields.

The ground was covered quite thoroughly, and every gas well in the vicinity was visited. At the Halliday well, which is blocked in, and is said to have a tremendous gas pressure, a test was given. Gas was turned on through three of the vent pipes and ignited. The flames came out with a terrific roar, followed by a miniature explosion when they were lighted. The flames shot out several rods in length. The visitors were satisfied that there is indeed a strong pressure in this well.

Lunch was served at Mr. Halliday's home, and Mr. Halliday and family were more than hospitable.

The aldermen returned late in the evening, all thoroughly tired out with their day's exertion, ready to enjoy a solid night's sleep.
