An address on "The Women of the
South," by Miss Lalia Halfkenny, will be
given in the vestry of the Baptist church
on Thursday evening, Sept. 12th, at
eight o'clock. Miss Halfkenny has been
engaged for two years as teacher of
English and Education at Harbourside
Memorial College, in Richmond, Va.

This mission school among the colored
women of the south was founded in 1883
by Joseph Harbourside, in memory of his
sainted wife, and is supported by the
Woman's Home Missionary Society of
New England. Its purpose is the rais-
ing up of a body of educated christian
women, among the African race, to the

field of the world. Miss Halfkenny is a
graduate of Acadia Seminary with a high
record for ability. She is a fine elocu-
tionist, and a lady of high christian
character. She is also a member of the
Woman's Christian Temperance Union
of this place, and her sisters would be

of which will go to assist Miss Halfkenny
in her work.
