Public Library Wanted.

The organization of a public library in Wolfville is a proposition which is not unfamiliar to the readers of the ACADIAN. Once again we would respectfully submit it to the consideration of the people of the town.

It is somewhat surprising that in Wolfville, a town which is almost Athenian in its educational tone, an institution of this kind has not, long before this, found a place.

The utility of an institution of this kind cannot for a moment be questioned. For the citizen who has no large library at home, to have access to the best and most helpful of books with which he may consult whenever occasion demands, is an education in itself.

The expense of such an undertaking would not be at all great. Of course we do not propose to start with an Alexandrian library all at once, but if a beginning were made, the contributions of publishers and others would be found to fill the shelves to a considerable extent and it would grow of itself.
