LOW RATE ON COAL

Alberta Product to go into Ontario For \$6.50 a Ton

HAMILTON, March 20—From information received here it is probable that Ontario will receive a low freight rate on Alberta coal, J. Sturcbury, of the Alberta Trade Commission has advised Hamilton civic officials, that negotiations have been almost completed whereby the rate for Alberta coal to this province will be \$6.50 per ton. With this freight rate local dealers stated yesterday that the western coal could be sold to consumers in Ontario at from \$12.00 to \$12.50 a ton.

CANADA RECEIVES REPARATIONS

Hon. P. C. Larkin, Canadian High Commissioner in London, has received from the British Treasury, on behalf of the Canadian Government, 135,475 pounds, representing Canada's share of the sums already received by the Imperial Government under the Dawes annuity plan from Germany. Future amounts are expected to be received by the High Commissioner in the course of a few months.
