## AT THE CITY HALL

The weekly meeting of the Municipal Commission was held last night. Chairman Gosling and Commissioner Morris, Mullaly, Peet, Jackman, Ayre and Vincombe were present. After minutes of last meeting were confirmed, the following matters received consideration.

The Inspector General is to be asked if late Reserve Fireman Harvey was insured in any scheme in connection with his department or if there was a fund from which his family could be assisted as the Council is most willing to subscribe to such a fund.

Communication of Govt. Engineer Hall regarding C.I. Pipe was referred to the Engineer.

Deputy Minister of Public Works Harris asked that Council employees undertake the removal of snow from Government buildings as arranged last season. Request was granted.

A communication was read from British Import Co. re-choking of sewer leading to their premises, and requested sewerage employees give the matter attention for which they guaranteed to pay costs. This was agreed to.

Chairman Johnson of the Dickenson Memorial Committee asked Council to allow them more space at Cavendish Square. Request was not acceded to.

H. A. Ross, representing W. Heap & Co., solicited share of patronage in the supplying of the city works with C.I. Pipe, fittings, etc. Application was ordered filed.

Cofa. Jackman spoke of the deplorable condition of affairs at Rossiter's Lane. The Inspector General will be communicated with on the matter.

The committee appointed to investigate the charges made by the Monroe Export Co. against Waterman Flynn, for discriminating in connection with the watering of shipping, reported having exonerated Mr. Flynn from said charges.

Reports of City Engineer, Health Officer, etc., were read.

The following appointments made at a special meeting of the Council during the past week were confirmed at last night's meeting, namely—Mr. J. J. Mahony to be Secretary Treasurer; Mr. W. P. Ryan to be City Engineer and Mr. Lloyd Woods to be 2nd Assistant Engineer, while Mr. Thos. Bird who served the city so faithfully for over 29 years as foreman of the Sewerage Department, was placed on the retired list.

After the passing of pay rolls and bills the meeting adjourned.
