Mr. and Mrs. Halbert Belyea spent Sunday at the home of her father, Odbur Shaw, Simonds.

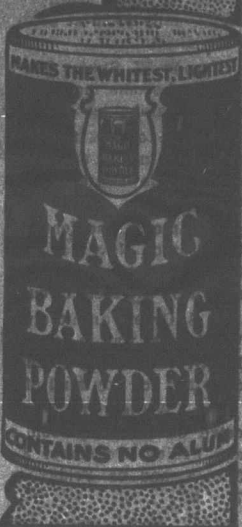
Letha Buchanan who has been very ill is gaining slowly.

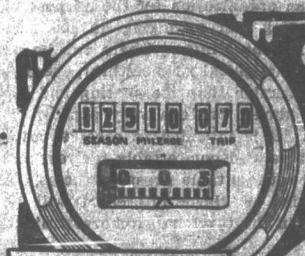

Hayward motored to Woodstock and were the guests of Mrs. Hayward's sister, Mrs. Phillips.

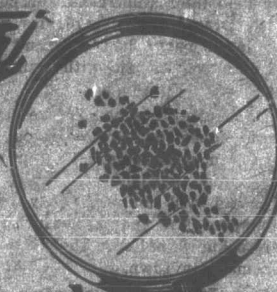
Preston Adams, the young son of Mr. and Mrs. Lester Adams, who scaled himself quite badly some time ago, is now better.

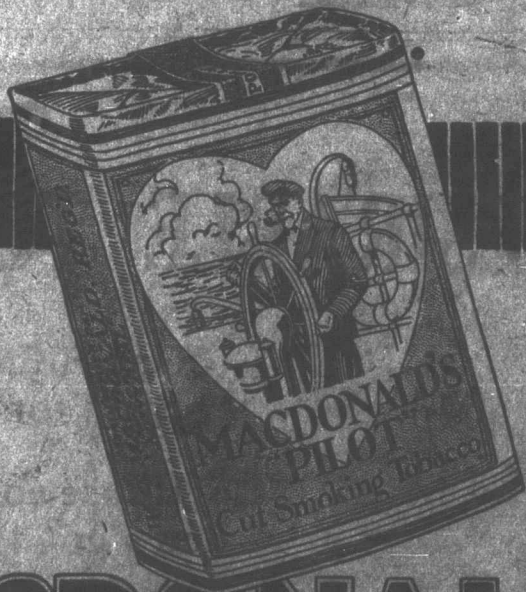
