THE FARMER'S REALM.

Practical Suggestions For
The Improvement of
The Farm.

DON'T WAIT FOR THE LAST EGG.

At this season of the year nearly every farmer and poultry keeper has a greater or less number of fowls that should be turned off, and which he has fully concluded to market when production is over, but the tendency is to hold them too long. It is infrequent that good egg producing stock will continue laying until the moult, is well under way and in consequence the birds are not in fit condition for market when the loosening feathers disclose the fact that the season's work is completed.

In many flocks and stock is carried over from year to year at a loss merely because the last egg is demanded and when it is obtained the fowls exhausted and reduced in condition and weight fully sufficient to equal the value of the last dozen eggs obtained.

The preferable plan is to determine the condition of the old bird's plumage by examination, also their weight about the middle of August or before an egg is laid, there is any indication of preparation for moulting it is better to market them all at once even if some would continue laying for some time. Where the flock kept is of considerable size the opportunity is thus given to dispose of the old stock to the best advantage, which means quite an item. It is a positive loss to carry over a lot of old stock that will not lay an egg until next summer and then, only a few of them. Kill the old cock and all heavy hens over two years old, and make room for young stock and be more in.

POULTRY BREEDING ON THE FARM.

The first requirement is the selection of eggs from vigorous and well developed stock—producing germs in which the activity of the parent stock will be manifest from the beginning of life—and then when the egg has been placed in the incubator—after having made yourself familiar with its action—constant attention to details will alone secure success, and then the easiest part of the work is started, the rearing of the chick always proving the drawback, but this can be accomplished with the same degree of success if the proper attention is given to the quantity and quality of feed at the different stages of its growth and suitable quarters with changes of location of the growth of the chicks requires—the question of expense not becoming an item with the farmer. There is no reason in the world why nine-tenths of the farmers situated around the larger towns and cities should not, especially during the months when active farming does not engage them, make artificial incubation a profitable investment and provide quite considerably for the increasing demand. The incubator and brooder have been charged with poor results, when in most instances it was due to the operator or poor eggs. If this branch of the farming industry is given half the care and interest that other branches receive there is no question but what the supply will be greatly advanced and the farmer will be pecuniarily benefited.—W. C. Connell in Live Stock World.

RICHARDS CO'S TRANSFER

Papers Will be Signed in Fredericton Next Month—Price About \$750,000—Americans Have Started Work.

Fredericton, Aug. 22—On some date on or between September 15th and 20th the transfer of 166,000 acres of lumber land, mills, etc., from the William Richards Co. to the International Paper Co. of New York will be made. Those who are to make the transfer will meet in this city on or between the date mentioned and the papers will then be signed and everything put through. So far as can be learned the price to be paid will be \$600,000 and \$750,000.

The property which the Americans are purchasing gives them control of all the Richards Co.'s business on the Miramichi and they will therefore only retain their property at Campbellton.

The property to change hands includes 166,000 acres of timber

land on the Taxis river, the Richards Co.'s mills at Boiestown and Chatham and the rest of the Richards plant.

The International Paper Co. will soon commence work upon the erection of a modern and large pulp mill at Chatham. The mill will have a large capacity.

Already the International Paper Co. have started to send men into the woods and several crews have started work under the temporary superintendence of H. H. Gunter of the Richards Co. One crew of 35 men in charge of John Robbins are building a dam on the main Taxis while Saunders Price with a crew of 30 men has commenced logging for the newcomers on the Sisters Waters. It is impossible to learn how much the Americans will cut this winter.—Gleaner.
