Homestead Regulations.
Any even numbered section of
Dominion Lands in Manitoba,
Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting
8 and 26, not reserved, may be
homesteaded by any person who is
the sole head of a family, or any
male over 18 years of age, to the
extent of one-quarter section of
160 acres more or less.

Application for entry must be
made in person by the applicant at
a Dominion Lands Agency or Sub
agency for the district in which the
land is situated. Entry by proxy
may, however, be made at an Agency
on certain conditions by the father,
mother, son, daughter,
brother or sister of an intending
homesteader.

The homesteader is required to
perform the homestead duties under
one of the following plans:
(1). At least six months' residence
upon and cultivation of the land
in each year for three years.
(2). A homesteader may, if he
so desires, perform the required
residence duties by living on farming
land owned solely by him, not less
than eighty (80) acres in extent,
in the vicinity of his homestead.
Joint ownership in land
will not meet this requirement.

(3). If the father (or mother
if the father is deceased), of a
homesteader has permanent residence
on farming land owned solely by
him, not less than eighty (80)
acres in extent, in the vicinity of
the homestead, or upon a homestead
entered for by him in the vicinity,
such homesteader may perform
his own residence duties by living
with the father (or mother
if the father is deceased).

(4). The term "vicinity" in the
two preceding paragraphs is defined
as meaning not more than nine
miles in a direct line, exclusive of
the width of road allowances crossed
in the measurement.

(5). A homesteader intending
to perform his residence duties in
accordance with the above while
living with parents or on farming
land owned by himself must notify
the Agent for the district of such
intention.

Six months' notice in writing
should be given to the Commissioner
of Dominion Lands at Ottawa
of intention to apply for patent.

FOREST FIRE.
Chatham world: Chief Game Warden
Robinson's office was to be
abolished in a few days, and draw his
salary for nothing, but kept right on

that a forest fire was started about
the 25th of May, on Tilley Road,
that had been burning for 24 hours

quired by law. The fire spread to ad-
joining lands doing considerable
damage. Mr. Robinson laid information
against them. The trial was held
June 24th before Mr. Albert Robi-
nson, Commissioner of the District of
Tracadie, and both of the culprits
pleaded guilty of the charge. Fines of
\$40 and costs were imposed. The costs
