TO SELL LIGHTING PLANT TO THE CITY. (Continued from page 1.) in the outer districts. The offer will be laid before the Board of Works on Tuesday evening next.

The health report for the week shows eleven cases of mumps, four of scarlet fever, three of chickenpox, two each of whooping cough and measles and one of diphtheria and German measles. The fame of Hamilton's tar macadam has travelled far and wide. The City Engineer received a letter this morning from the parks commission in Boston. The members want to come here and get pointers on tar macadam.

City Engineer Barrow says he has received further information about the cost of installing a gas pumping plant to supply the east end mountain residents with water which convinces him that the system will be the best for what is wanted there. The operating costs each year are estimated at \$168.

Allan Studholme, the member from East Hamilton, is taking up the case of William Grey and other immigrants brought to this country by the Salvation Army, and who said they were misled. He will probably bring the matter up in the House.

The Markets Committee will meet on Monday evening. Chairman Juttien, of the Sewers Commission, says that unless the Dominion Government can be induced to pay for the work of continuing the overflow sewers through the re-vent wall, it may be necessary to stop the filling in work there this year. The city has not a dollar to spare. Unless something is done, he says, the space behind the re-vent wall threatens to become worse than Coal Oil Inlet, as during a heavy flow the disposal works cannot handle all the sewage, which is blown back behind the wall with an east wind. It caused much annoyance last fall.

Still another big Yankee trust is about to enter the manufacturing field in the Dominion with a view of evading the Canadian tariff. It is the American Can Company, the so-called tin trust. It is said that it will decide within ten days where it will locate. It proposes erecting a factory at an initial expenditure of \$250,000, and employing five hundred hands. Assessment Commissioner Macleod has his net out for it.

Brandon, Man., March 20.-At the Assizes this morning the jury returned a verdict of guilty against Ernest Shouline, charged with attempted assault on a five-year-old daughter of a Shoal Lake hotel man, where the accused had been staying. Judge Perdue sentenced him to four months hard labor and ten lashes.

DEAD IN THE CLUB HOUSE. Fred Mundy is Found With Bullet in His Chest. Chatham, March 20.-Fred Mundy, caretaker at the St. Anne's Clubhouse on Mitchell's Bay, is reported here today as having been found dead with a bullet hole in his chest, but the details are not known. An inquest is likely.
