Duties: Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his 51-3 homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and ocupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader

and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3 per acre. Duties: Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.
