**PROHIBITION ALMOST CERTAIN IN NEWFOUNDLAND**  
Only 685 Votes Needed and One Poll to Hear From is Expected to Carry More Than the Required Number.  
St. John's, Nfld., Nov. 15—Fortune Bay district declared the poll in the prohibition election today. The result was 1,091 votes for prohibition, 110 against. This leaves only 685 votes from St. Barbe district to carry prohibition for the whole island, and it is generally conceded that more than this number will be obtained.
