

to Take the Oath.

Ottawa, Ont., May 26 .- Considerable comment has been caused in the Civil Service by the refusal of an officer of one of the departments to take the oath of allegiance to King George V. It seems that when the other employees presented themselves this one abstained from going to the room where the Clerk of the Privy Council was administering the oath.

The remedy will be in his salary being stopped by the Auditor General. The reason assigned is that the clerk took the stand that the oath is similar to the Coronation Oath in its reference to Roman Catholics, which is not at all the case.
