STARS DEFEAT ST. BON'S BY THREE GOALS TO ONE.

Though the weather was piercing cold last evening a goodly crowd of spectators were at St. George's Field to see the football match between the Stars and St. Bonaventure's teams.

St. Bon's—G. Byrne, goal; J. O'Flaherty, F. Collins, backs; Mogue Power, W. Hearn, J. Rawlins, halves; R. Callahan, S. Shortall, Callahan, H. Meehan, W. Templeman, forwards.

When the leather was set rolling for several minutes there was some very even play in midfield in which both teams gave a good exhibition of combination and passing, and this was a marked feature all through the contest.

After a while the Stars gradually worked west and Jackman passed to Neddy Power who headed the leather for the goal but gave it too much side and it went wide. The Stars kept pressing on St. Bon's goal and their backs were kept busy, when a foul throw against the Stars Rawlins made a good shot but the ball bounded off Shortall and went back.

Both Brien and Duggan now tried shots for St. Bon's goal but the ball was skied and went out over the goal posts. After the sphere was again kicked from goal Jackman worked it up on the wing and passed to Brien who sent it into the goal mouth, when a scrimmage occurred, and sent the ball between the twines scoring the 1st goal for the Stars, just 25 minutes after play began.

Re-entering the ball R. Callahan, for St. Bon's, made a dash east and would have scored but was checked as he shot and the ball went wide.

W. Callahan presently had another trial but with a similar result, when a foul against Hearn, of St. Bon's, Morgan worked the ball up on the right wing. St. Bon's conceded a corner but nothing resulted. Then Jackman had a trial for goal, but the St. Bon's backs prevented scoring. Stars secured another corner off Rawlins, a second and third quickly, but nothing came of them. The Star forwards now rushed west, when the redoubtable Toby Jackman got the ball up the wing and kicked up No. 2 for Stars amidst much applause. Less than a minute afterwards the teams crossed—Stars, 2 goals; St. Bon's, 0.

SECOND HALF.

The Stars now played with their old time dash and vigour, though St. Bon's put up a plucky fight. Immediately the ball was again kicked off and the Stars were down on St. Bon's goal, two uneventful corners were secured, St. Bon's called on Clare, who saved well, and then the Stars got back once more in St. Bon's territory, both Toby and R. Jackman had shots for goal but failed, after which Morgan, who played a fine game, got down on the left wing and passing to Adams, he sent in No. 3 goal for Stars, who were loudly applauded. The Stars now for a while were tried but they went wide, when after hands had been recorded against Duggan, who for a while was knocked out by a kick in the stomach, R. Callahan got up field on the run, shot true and secured the only goal for St. Bon's. St. Bon's now bucked up and made several attempts at scoring, the Stars returned in kind, and the referee's whistle blew with the Stars the victors by 3 goals to 1.

How Hawco Was Killed

Special to Evening Telegram: EAST WABANA.

Last Evening, Thomas Hawco, aged 22, a native of Harbor Main, was fatally injured to-day in Dominion No. 2. He expired shortly after being brought to hospital. Hawco was employed as a triprunner in the main, slope, and while coming up the slope on a loaded trip he jumped off and was struck by the empty trip coming down. The deceased is a son of Moses Hawco, and was in the employ of the Company for the past five months.

Looks Like a Fatality.

Yesterday afternoon the Marine and Fisheries Department had the following message from Port de Grave:—

"About 10 a.m. to-day two men, William and Joseph Patten, while coming from the fishing grounds picked up a small boat or punt without any oars, only a short end of board which apparently was used to steer was aboard. Boat was found in gulch near lighthouse. The occupant had left a fishing line on board with a sigger attached and caught fast to the rocks near the water's edge. Abram Patten and brothers saw the boat going towards the land early this morning with one man on board, using something over the stern but without oars or sail, going before the wind. The boat was hauled up at Hills-hole. Some of the men say it belongs to John Parsons, of Freshwater, Bell Island, and think some tragedy has happened.

Imperial Topics Under Discussion

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, To-Day. At the Imperial Conference yesterday Mr. De Villiers Groo, Minister of Public Works of United South Africa, moved a resolution, on behalf of South Africa, against the methods of shipping combines. He cited the Sherman Anti-Trust Law of the States, making rebates illegal and as greatly benefitting American shippers. He added that American shippers were greatly in need of a similar measure.

Mr. Buxton declared the feeling of the shippers of the United Kingdom was not strong enough against the rebate system to justify such a legislative prohibition, but he agreed to support an amended resolution providing for concerted action by all the Governments of the Empire against shipping combines when it was shown they were prejudicial to the trade of the Empire. The amended resolution passed.

The Conference agreed to the proposal of Sir W. Laurier, supported by Sir Edward Grey, suggesting that negotiations should be opened with the Imperial Government with a view of securing to any of the Overseas Dominions the right of withdrawal from any special treaty without the consent of the remainder of the Empire. The Conference also agreed to a proposal to appoint a Royal Commission to visit the Overseas Dominions and report on the trade resources and the best methods of their development.

A long discussion concerning the "All Fed" route took place. This question revealed numerous difficulties of opinion and practical difficulties. Mr. Lloyd-George explained that the cost of a 21 knot service was prohibitive and that of an 18 knot service enormous. Finally a limited resolution was carried to the effect that it was desirable to establish the best possible service.
