Marconi Station.

Capt. Wm. Bartlett and a staff of men left for Fogo this morning by the s.s. Fogota to erect a Marconi station there. The work will occupy about four weeks. They took down three large spars which, when seized end to end and erected, will run up 200 feet. Fogo is well situated for a Marconi station and it is expected that this one will be the most useful in the Newfoundland service during the seal-fishing time. Ships that have the wireless apparatus on board should be able to communicate with the Fogota station at least 200 miles off. The station will be open for business by sealing time.

Big Sea and Undertow.

All yesterday a big sea ran in the Narrows breaking right across there, and occasionally it went over the high land at the North Head. The undertow in the harbour rendered it dangerous to leave ships at the piers and several were hauled into the stream yesterday afternoon. The Fogota, Galveston, Solway and Stephano were hauled out in the centre of the harbor. The latter did some damage to Harvey & Co's pier. The pilots could not proceed beyond Chain Rock owing to the high sea which ran.

TANGIER, Jan. 5.
A large force of revolting Moroccan tribesmen, according to a wireless from Fez, attacked a town four days' journey to the south of the capital. The garrison of the town, under the command of French officers, offered a gallant defence, and finally succeeded in repulsing the enemy and making them retreat to the desert, leaving fifty dead. The garrison lost five killed and fifteen wounded.

ARMAGH, Ireland, Jan. 5.
A meeting to protest against Home Rule was held to-day, at which thousands attended. Sir Edward Carson was the principal speaker, and referring to his position in resisting the Home Rule Bill, said if he was a rebel it could be tested in the law courts. "If," said Carson, "my determination that Ireland should remain a part of the United Kingdom means that I am a rebel, I plead guilty, and let the government do its worst."

CALCUTTA, Jan. 5.
King George and Queen Mary witnessed a great pageant in their honor to-day. Two processions, in which were fifty elephants and hundreds of camels and horses and state cars, passed the King and Queen. More than 100,000 natives took part, and gave their Majesties an ovation.

LONDON, Jan. 5.
There is reason to believe that the general conditions of a peace settlement between Italy and Turkey have already been arranged, says the Salonika correspondent of the Times, and that the near future will see a termination of hostilities.

LONDON, Jan. 5.
Following the action of the Ulster Unionists in declaring that they would not accept Home Rule, and would set up a separate government, sensational rumors are in circulation, that Orangemen are preparing to resist Home Rule by force of arms. It is asserted that, despite precautions, drilling is going on in Ulster on an extensive scale.

HEALTH REPORT. — A resident of Signal Hill developed diphtheria yesterday. There are four cases of scarlet fever in one family on Dunford Street and one case at 92 Barnes Road. Two patients with scarlet fever were removed from their residence, foot of Pleasant St., to the Hospital yesterday.

HEAVY SNOW FALL. — Not for 20 years have the people of the North Shore witnessed such a snow fall as that of the past three days. The roads are blocked in all directions and traffic suspended. The mailman could not connect with the Carbonara train, an incident which has not been noted for years.

Lieutenant-General Sir Robert Baden-Powell distributing the prizes at "artisans' Hall" recently in connection with the Trades Training Schools, said that having travelled a good deal he knew how good foreigners were in their own particular line, but they had not the imagination, self-reliance, and adaptiveness natural to the British-born man.

I have also to thank you from the bottom of my heart for your kind gift of a pair of boots.

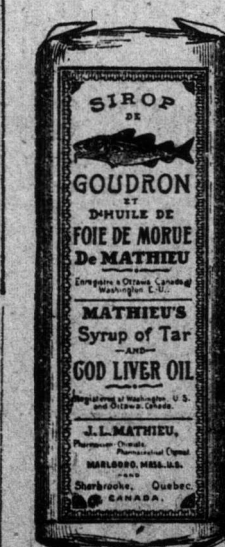

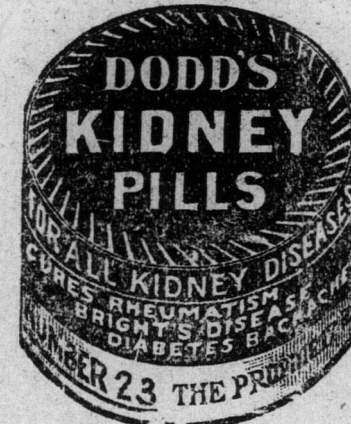
