Heroic Death of N. Y. Man.

CARRIED WIFE AND CHILD FROM BURNING BUILDING, BUT PERISHED WITH DAUGHTER.

New York, Dec. 13.—While making a heroic effort to save his 14-year-old daughter Lillian, from their burning home at Woodside, Melville Mendel, a New York lawyer, and the girl perished in each other's arms. Mendel was carrying the girl to safety when he was overcome by smoke and when the bodies were found the girl had her arms still clasped about her father's neck.

The Mendel family occupied the second floor. The fire had made such headway when the lawyer was aroused by the shouts of the family on the first floor. Seizing his wife, Mendel carried her to safety, then returned for his two children. Mendel found his 12-year-old son groping in the hall way and carried him out. By this time he was nearly overcome by the smoke and the interior of the building was a seething furnace. Disregarding the entreaties of his wife, he again plunged into the building.

Those on the street could hear above the roar of the fire the girl's voice crying:

"Father, please save me!"
Soon all sound died away. Mendel did not reappear, and the firemen knew that it was useless to attempt to save him. Half an hour later, when flames were subdued and searchers entered the building, they found the two bodies in a parlor off the girl's bedroom, where they had fallen.

New Coal Vessel.

An improved type of coal-carrying vessel has just been launched at Glyth, near Newcastle, England which, in opinion of experts, will be in a new era in the building of cargo ships. The vessel is constructed on what is known as the "arch" principle which, it is claimed, offers important advantages over boats of the ordinary type, with a dead weight of 3,100 tons and a draft of 18 feet 4 inches. It is asserted to be the fastest coaler built and it will be used for coaling purposes in connection with the British fleet. Smaller capital outlay, cheaper maintenance, and increased rate of speed are among the favorable features claimed for the vessel.

Death of a Prominent Nfldr.

The Brockton Times, of the 4th inst., thus refers to the funeral which was largely attended:

"The funeral of Patrick J. Brophy, was held from the home, 21 Eaters' prize St., Tuesday morning at 7.30 and from St. Edward's Church, at 8. Rev. E. J. Bolan celebrated a high mass of requiem. Rev. Leo J. Logan was deacon and Rev. Francis Kearney sub-deacon. After the service the body was taken by Undertaker C. M. Hickney to Malden, where burial will be in Holy Cross cemetery."
