The Telephone System.

Strong representations were made in the House of Assembly yesterday by the Liberal leader, Mr. Kent, and by Mr. Hickman, on the need of an improved telephone system for the city. Both endorsed the strong stand taken by the Board of Trade, and set forth the difficulty of carrying on a conversation without interruptions and without being overheard. Mr. Hickman said an expert engaged by the Board of Trade had declared an up-to-date system could be installed for the city at a cost of some \$50,000. Mr. Hickman also estimated that the present rentals amounted to some \$28,000, and that therefore there was an ample income to provide for the running expenses of such a system and to provide a margin for good dividends should a charter be given to a private corporation. Mr. Kent pointed out that three years ago a loan of \$150,000 was authorized for this purpose and for an outport telephone system. The Prime Minister said the Government Engineer had been instructed to go into the question and had been abroad and had examined a number of systems and reported to the Government some twelve months ago. The Government had found many difficulties in the way and they had not come to any decision. The Government had had in contemplation a new system for the city with long distance connection to such places as Bay of Islands. He feared the estimate of \$50,000 referred to by Mr. Hickman was too low. His recollection was that the estimate of the Government Engineer was \$150,000, but he could not say definitely that it included only a service within the limits of the city. In reply to an inquiry of Mr. Lloyd, the Prime Minister stated that the Government had not decided whether or not they would institute a Government system or not. The Government were still considering the whole question. The whole matter is unsatisfactory. The Anglo-American cannot be expected to spend money on improvements while a state of doubt exists as to the intentions of the Government.

Meigle Here.

The s.s. Meigle arrived in port from Trepassey at 9.15 p.m. yesterday, after a fairly good run from there, having left at noon. The ship left Placentia at 8 a.m. Saturday and had to run into Trepassey that evening to escape the approaching storm. The Meigle brings no report of the Blanche Currie, which in all probability was driven off to sea, and with the present weather conditions will be some time reaching land again.

Quick Passage.

The barq. Gaspe, Capt. Connors, reached Pernambuco yesterday after a run of 25 days from this port. The ship experienced very stormy weather on the passage, and in view of this the trip was one of the quickest made in recent years. The quickest passage ever made to Pernambuco by a vessel from this port was made by the Onyx, a schooner sailing from Tessier's, in 1892. She made the run in 17 days, but was lost on the return voyage.

On Tuesday evening a young lad named Samson Brushett, was run down by a horse near the Long Bridge the cog of the shoe inflicting a nasty wound in his forehead. He was picked up by Constable Sheppard and taken to O'Mara's drug store, and in the meantime Dr. Roberts was summoned and had the lad conveyed to his surgery, where he was obliged to insert several stitches in the wound, after which the boy was taken to his home on Water St. West.

House Burned Down.

Woman Injured.

Yesterday morning at 7.30 a fire occurred at Gould's Brook, about three miles from Brigus Junction, which resulted in the total destruction of the house occupied by John Skeans and his family, and situated about a mile from Noseworthy's saw mill at Mather's siding. The origin of the fire is unknown. Two of the inmates of the house, Mrs. Skeans and her daughter, a little girl of twelve years, received serious burns, and the former was so badly burned about the scalp that Dr. Gill, who was summoned from Brigus, about 21 miles distant from Gould's Brook, advised that she be taken to the Hospital. She arrived by last night's train, accompanied by the doctor, and was conveyed to the institution. Mrs. Skeans, who is not blessed with much of this world's goods, had a few dollars placed in a private receptacle in the house, and in an effort to save the money rushed through the flames, with the result that her head was badly burned. The little girl, who was apparently trying to assist her mother in this futile effort, received some serious burns also. John Skeans and his family moved up from Collier's to Gould's Brook recently and his was the only house there, the nearest one being that occupied by the employees of Noseworthy's saw mill, which is about a mile away.
