ALEXANDER POPE born 1688. The celebrated English poet and translator of Homer. He was the son of a London draper, and early showed great poetic gifts. In 1711 he published his famous "Essay on Criticism." His finest work is his "Essay on Man."

SIR JOHN MILLAIS born 1829. At one time the most prominent of the English pre-Raphaelite School of Painters, but soon cast himself free from its mannerisms and began the production of a long series of famous pictures, becoming the most popular artist of the day. His "Bubbles" bought by Peers has been spread all over the world.

DOUGLAS JERROLD died 1857, aged 54. Dramatist and humorist, who enjoyed a long career of success by his contributions to Punch.

CHARLES READE born 1814. Some put him in the very first rank of novelists. His works have done much to reform many abuses in England. "The Cloister and the Hearth" is one of the finest novels in the language.

NEWS BY CABLE.

Special to Evening Telegram.
LONDON, To-day.
The Fifth Earl of Castle Stewart, male representative Royal Stewart of Scotland, is dead.

PANAMA, To-day.
When the Alliance Panama railroad ship passes through the Gatun Locks to-day, she will be the first passenger vessel to use the locks of the Canal.

MEXICO CITY, To-day.
The Foreign Office sent a note to the Legations, notifying that Tampico has been blockaded by order of Huerta. The United States Government was also notified through the Spanish Minister at Washington.

LONDON, To-day.
An announcement is to be made at an early date which will not be altogether surprising, of the betrothal of Grand Duke Michael of Russia and Princess Patricia of Connaught. The Grand Duke has long been an admirer of the Princess. The wedding is not expected to take place till next year.

LONDON, To-day.
The Allan Line steamer Corinthian collided with and sank the steamer Oriole, a small vessel which plies on the River Thames, off Greenwich last night. The Oriole had just landed passengers at London Bridge, four miles above Greenwich, and was returning to her moorings when the accident happened. The crew were saved.

MONTREAL, To-day.
Hundreds of messages of sympathy are still being received at the C.P.R. offices re the loss of the Empress of Ireland, mixed with sympathetic expressions for the Canadian Pacific Railway, Captain Kendall, passengers and crew of the ill-fated Empress. However, Capt. Andersen, of the Storstad, is not without supporters in his dark hour, and here in Montreal many people believe that in public view he has been made a scapegoat in connection with the sinking of the Empress quite unjustly. As to this question probably the Commission of Investigation will decide which of the commanders was to blame. If there was direct blame. The attempt of the C.P.R. to mulct the Storstad's owners for two million dollars damage, promises to be a big legal battle. The owners of the Storstad have engaged prominent counsel from New York, and they have a counter claim for \$50,000.
