## At the City Hall.

The Chairman, Messrs. Harris, Ayre, McNamara, Bradshaw, Jackman, McGrath, Anderson and Withers were present at last night's meeting of the Civic Commission.

The Commercial Cable Co. asked if they were liable to a municipal tax other than that on their building if they transferred their office to within the city limits. A general discussion followed and it was decided to ask the Solicitor to report on the matter. G. M. Barr complained of his store being flooded by a defective sewer. The Engineer's report showed that the trouble was due to high tide. A copy of the said report will be forwarded to Mr. Barr.

W. F. Butler submitted plans of proposed suite of offices for T. & M. Winter. The plans were approved subject to the Municipal regulations. John Flynn, waterman, applied for an increase of salary. A committee will enquire into the matter and report.

The Committee of enquiry into conditions at Battery Town were of the opinion that H. Reid should be permitted to continue the erection of his dwelling. This permission will not in any way give the applicant any right to the property, and in erecting the building he is to assume all risks and becomes subject to any regulations the Council may adopt in future.

The Health Officer reported that it was not desirable to permit the further erection of stables in Lime St. The Engineer reported a reduction in the water pressure throughout the city during the past week, owing to taps being left running at night.

It was decided that in future applications forwarded the Board during the week will be referred to the departments concerned, and reports submitted with the applications at the regular meeting.

Inspector Hambrick reported that the cost of breaking stone by hand during the week, amounted to \$1.85 per ton, against 40 cents by machinery plus the cost of power, and wear and tear of machinery. Breaking by hand had been tried as an experiment in order to give labor, but owing to the high cost it will have to be discontinued.

Mr. McNamara, Chairman of the Office Committee, reported on the claims of the officials who had performed extra services for the Council and recommended that they be paid. The report was adopted.

Requisitions from the Park Committee were granted.

The Health Officer reported five cases of diphtheria within the city during the week.

The Secretary reported that the number of persons coming to the offices to pay taxes, had greatly increased since the new system of sending out notices had been adopted.

## This Date in History.

FEBRUARY 6.

Days Past—36 To Come—228  
SIR HENRY IRVING born 1838. The most prominent English actor of the close of the Victorian period. His record at the Lyceum Theatre covered a brilliant series of productions. "The Bells" was the first triumph, then followed "Charles I." and "Eugene Aram" and later a number of Shakespearean impersonations, in some of which notably "Shylock" and "Hamlet." Irving was really great.  
DR. JOSEPH PRIESTLY died 1804, aged 71. English scientist—the discoverer of oxygen and other gases and author of "A History of Electricity." He was also a great advocate of freedom and progress and having expressed approval of the French Revolution, a Birmingham mob set fire to his house, destroying his valuable library and scientific apparatus. Sometime afterward he removed to America, where he died.

QUEEN ANNE born 1665. The second daughter of James II, and succeeded to the English throne on the death of William III. In 1702. With her death in 1714, the Stuart line of Sovereigns ended, the throne passing to the House of Hanover by the Act of Settlement.

CHARLES DICKENS born 1812. The most popular novelist of the 19th century, who from very humble beginnings worked himself up by sheer genius to the highest position in the world of letters. His literary output was enormous.

SIDNEY COOPER died 1902, aged 99. A highly gifted animal painter, whose pictures of cattle and sheep are always masterly.

LORD GOSCHEN died 1907, aged 76. A statesman of strong personality who held various offices under Mr. Gladstone, separating from him on the Home Rule question. He was First Lord of the Admiralty from 1895 to 1900.

HELIGOLAND LIGHTHOUSE.

The most important lighthouse at the present time, so far, as actual operations are concerned, is the Light of Heligoland, from the fact that it is centred in the very heart of the naval war zone. Heligoland was ceded by Great Britain to Germany in 1890, in return for concessions made to Britain in East Africa.

The Heligoland light is an electric one, and the most powerful in Germany, and is claimed by the Germans to be the most powerful light in existence. The light consists of a cluster of three revolving lights, having a lighting power of 40,000,000 candles, a magnitude of light which is almost impossible to describe. The light is so hard and difficult to realize. The lights are on the searchlight principle, and the cluster is surrounded by a single light of the same kind and size, that can be revolved independently and three times as fast as the three lights. The single light is put into use in case of accident to the cluster of three. The electric power is generated by two steam-engines, and boilers, running belt-driven electric generators.—J. W. O., in The Millgate Monthly.

The annual meeting of the Society for the Protection of Animals was held at the Seamen's Institute yesterday afternoon, those present being: Mr. Justice Johnson, who presided, Mrs. Goelling, Mrs. W. Monroe, Mrs. C. R. Steer, Miss S. E. Johnson, B. E. S. Dunfield, J. A. McDougall, A. Sheard, J. O'Driscoll, N. A. Outerbridge and Secretary C. J. Fox.

The reports of the Secretary and Treasurer were read and adopted. In the Secretary's report touching reference was made to the passing of His Grace Archbishop Howley and the Rev. Dr. Rogers, both of whom had been prominent members of the Society. Reference was also made to the absence of Capt. George Carly who is with the Newfoundland Regiment, and the greetings of the Society will be forwarded to him.

Votes of thanks were passed Mr. B. E. Dunfield, the late Secretary; Mr. Sheard, for the use of the Institute rooms; Inspector General Sullivan and the police for their assistance in carrying out the rules of the Society; Mr. Justice Johnson who conducted the election of officers; and the Press for references from time to time.

Florrie, the little four and a half year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Peter Gallivan, of Duckworth Street East, had a very close call from a watery grave yesterday afternoon at Wood's dock. She and several other children went on the ice near the shore. Thinking that the ice was stronger farther out they moved out. Suddenly the little girl Gallivan fell through the ice. Her companions, powerless to render assistance, screamed loudly. Three men, who were a short distance away, heard the alarm and ran hastily to the rescue, being barely in time to save the child from drowning. When taken from the icy water the victim was in an exhausted condition. Immediately a man brought her in his arms to a nearby house where the wet clothes were removed and she was wrapped in blankets. Later she was taken home and attended by a doctor.

## Singular Charge.

Two men named Brine and Coe were arrested under warrant at night and arraigned before Judge Knight to-day, charged with obtaining a free passage over the railway from Lewisporte to St. John's at the expense of the Crown. According to statement advanced by Inspector General Sullivan to the court, the accused were working in the lumber woods Campbellton as teamsters. They interviewed Mr. W. W. Bradley, J.P. Lewisporte on January 17th last, forming him that they intended to list with the second contingent. They gave false names and got free tickets issued them to St. John's, but did volunteer. The Inspector General said that the case was the first of kind he heard of in his experience. Accused pleaded not guilty to charge. The defendants were bailed while witnesses are brought here from Lewisporte.

(3) That judgment be entered for the Defendants as upon the count claim the Court or a Judge shall consider the Plaintiff to be entitled to.

(4) That the costs of this application be paid by the Plaintiff.

Howley, K.C., for the defendant is heard in support of the motion. It is ordered that the several attachments made in this matter be raised. The Court adjourned until 11 a.m. on Monday next.
